

Jones Eliminates Tolley in a Thrilling Extra Hole Match

QUIMET SHARES LINKS GLORY IN HECTIC BATTLE

Scots in Frenzy As Giants of Links Fight for Supremacy — 75's Carded On 18 Holes.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 28.—(AP)—Bobby Jones eliminated Cyril Tolley, defending champion in the fourth round of the British amateur golf championship, one up, in 18 holes.

The battle of the open champion of the United States against the amateur champion of Great Britain was a ding-dong match, square at the end of nine holes, Jones went one up at the 15th, but Tolley squared the match again at the 16th and the 17th was halved with birdie. The home hole, too, was a half and the extra hole was necessary.

Jones, by his victory eliminating the title holder, advanced to the fifth round, joining his Walker team-mate, George Vogt, who won his fourth round match before Jones finished his titanic struggle with the gigantic Tolley.

Quimet Wins. Francis Quimet shared the glory of the day with Jones, winning a thrilling 21-hole morning match in the third round after being four down. The former open and amateur champion of the United States had to sink a putt for a birdie three at the home hole to square his match.

George Von Elm, Detroit, won his way into the fifth round by defeating Walter H. Riecard, West Cornwall, five up and three to play.

Ten thousand madly excited Scots and all the Americans who could get here from London and other centers, saw the spectacular finish of the match of the champions.

All St. Andrews was packed about the home green and hanging from windows of the hotels and buildings nearby. After the

17th was halved with birdie fours and the home hole developed a pair of par fours, the crowd followed Jones and Tolley across the Swilcan burn to the 18th.

Putt Ends Match. At the extra hole Tolley was stymied and barely missed when he attempted to jump Jones' ball with a maulie. Jones holed a three-foot putt for a par four and the match was over.

With medal scores of 75 each, the two players, who are old friends, battled through every hole and every shot to the finish. They were never more than one hole apart and from the 11th through the 16th, they exchanged holes with not one halved.

It required five minutes to clear the fairway in front of the Royal and Ancient club so that they could hit their tee shots on the extra hole. Flanagan fearfully waved the galloping crowd back and were run down for their efforts.

Even Drives. With the fairway lined solidly from tee to green and people blackening every knoll and hummock for vantage points the American star and his big British opponent drove almost level, nearly 300 yards.

Jones was outdriven by the long hitting Tolley on the most of the holes on the second nine, but he offset Tolley's superior length from the tee by his putting.

Roland MacKenzie, Wilmington, Del., was eliminated by Kenneth Greig, St. Andrews, four up and three to play in the fourth round.

The defeat of MacKenzie marked the first Walker cup team casualty of the day and third of the week. Dr. O. F. Willing and Donald K. Moe losing yesterday.

Francis Quimet, Boston, won his second match of the day and advanced to the fifth round when he stopped J. Lynden Jones, Cardiff, seven up and six to play.

Harrison R. Johnston, St. Paul, American amateur champion, joined Jones, Vogt, Von Elm, and Quimet in the fifth round by defeating Reginald Straker, Walton Heath, three up and two to play.

BREEDER OF BLOODED HORSEFLESH IS DEAD

Junior Middleweights Will Stage Torrid Mat Match

Wrestling fans of Medford and southern Oregon can look forward to one of the hardest fought matches of the season next Monday night when Yaqui Joe of Sonora, Mexico, tangles with Henry Jones of Provo, Utah, for the world's junior middleweight championship.

The belt will be on display this week at Brown's. The Indian and Jones met a short time ago at Eugene in one of the toughest mat nattes ever seen in that city. Henry took the first fall in 17 minutes of fast wrestling after applying his famous whip wristlocks and completing the torture by an arm stretch.

Jones attempted to use the same hold for the second fall but the Indian had figured them out and refused an opening for the hold.

Yaqui Joe went on the offensive and applied his punishing body scissors which, although once broken by Jones, proved effective for the second fall in 12 minutes.

A series of Sonnenberg butts won the last fall for Jones in 30 minutes of torrid wrestling.

Yaqui Joe is a former title holder and is anxious to regain the lost prize and thinks he can do it in Medford. He is a prize winner for endurance and a glutton for punishment.

The Indian is a wizard with flying holds and plans to keep Jones plenty worried during the entire match. Joe is claimed to be a stronger man than Jones.

CHICAGO CUBS STAR PITCHER CARLSON, DIES

Ailing for Many Months, Player Suddenly Stricken in Chicago Hotel — Worked Wednesday.

CHICAGO, May 28.—(AP)—Hal Carlson, one of only two Chicago Cubs pitchers with a winning percentage for this season, died suddenly in his hotel room early today. He was 36 years old and married.

Dr. John F. Davis, physician for the baseball club, was called at 3 o'clock this morning when Carlson complained of severe stomach pains. Death occurred 35 minutes later as plans were being made to move him to a hospital.

Cliff Heathcote, Hazen Cuyler and Riggs Stephenson, Cub outfielders, were at Carlson's bedside when he died. Mrs. Carlson was at her home in Rockford, Ill., the city where Carlson was born. Besides the widow, a three-year-old child survives.

Carlson has not been in robust health for many months, although at the spring training camp on Catalina Island he was reported as being in better form than for years. He was a player who was conscientious in keeping himself in the best possible physical condition.

Carlson's pitching record, according to the latest official records which include games of last Wednesday, shows four games won and one lost.

The Chicago Cubs paid \$20,000 and gave two players, Kaufmann and Cooney, to the Philadelphia Nationals for Carlson two years ago.

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—(AP)—Dave Shade, elusive as a shadow, has bobbed his way with no uncertainty into the position as chief contender for Mickey Walker's middleweight crown.

The veteran Concord, Cal., gentleman of the lantern jaw, last night thrust the rough and tough Nebraska wildcat, Ace Hudkins, still farther down the pathway to fistic oblivion by gaining a rousing decision after 10 rounds of gory battle.

From beginning to end it was Shade's fight. The Nebraska found but a fleeting target for his terrific wallops, and paid dearly in return for his offerings as his opponent stabbed him with left jabs and clipped with stinging up-pershots.

Hudkins, in his usual flailing fashion, kept leading to the final going, although he was battered and bleeding from ears, nose and eyes. Shade appeared scarcely to have been touched.

Jack Doyle, promoter, said today that efforts would be made to match Shade with Walker for the middleweight crown here this summer. He lost to the Ramson, N. J., rocker several years ago when Mickey was welterweight king.

WASHINGTON HOLDS SAFE MARGIN IN AMERICAN—ST. LOUIS HARD PRESSED BY BROOKLYN ROBINS.

Washington is quite safe for the present, holding a margin of four games over the Philadelphia Athletics. However, the Senators cannot take many chances and still remain ahead. To get to its present position Washington has had to win seven games in a row and continue an almost unbroken streak through 20 contests. The Senators have won 11 of their last 12 games and 15 out of 29.

Sad Sam Effective. The Senators held their place yesterday by beating the New York Yankees, 7 to 2. Sad Sam Jones was the whole show. He held the Yankees to four hits, three of them going to Babe Ruth, pitched his fifth complete game of the year and won his sixth successive victory.

The Cardinal string of victories was broken for the second time in 19 games yesterday and St. Louis lost a fine chance to get a safer lead over the Brooklyn Robins. But the St. Louis hitters were not much more effective against Larry French, former Portland Coast

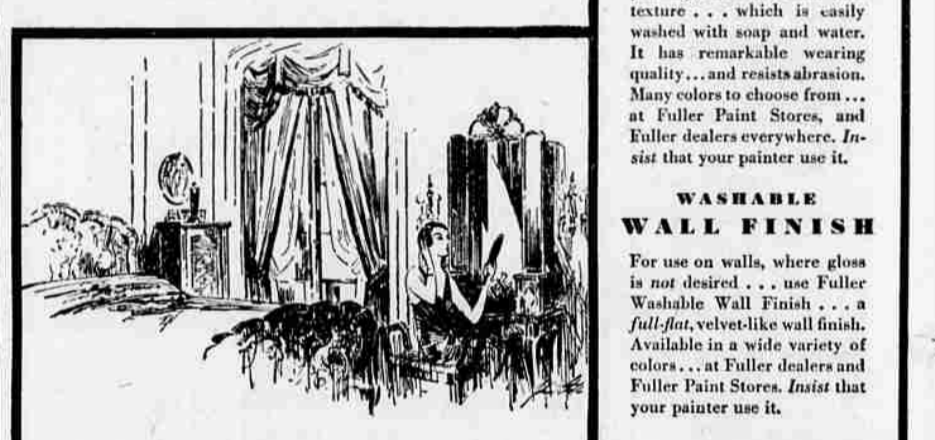
