DETOUR WARNING HITS AT MEDFORD

Reports have come to Medford that signs have been posted north of Grants Pass on the Pacific Highway warning California bound motorists that there is a bad detour south of Medford and that the Redwoods highway should be used for best results.

As a matter of fact, the detour south of this city takes motorists through a choice section of Jackson county's orchard and farming lands, and the road is in fairly good condition. This route is used during improvement work on the highway from Medford to Talent.

HILL-HAMAKER DAMAGE CASE IN ARGUMENT STAGE

Arguments in the damage suit of Mrs. Carrie L. Hill against M. S. Hamaker, truck operator, for approximately \$11,000, for injuries alleged to have been sustained as the result of an auto accident near Eagle Point a year ago, began today, with indications the case would be in the hands of the jury by mid-afternoon. Two previous trials resulted in mistrials.

Yesterday afternoon and this morning were devoted principally to medical testimony by Dr. C. T. Sweeney, who attended the plaintiff following the accident, and Dr. J. C. Hayes. Mrs. Hill underwent an examination yesterday afternoon, and had X-ray photographs taken, for trial purposes.

She avers she sustained broken ribs, a dislocated shoulder blade, and spinal injury as a result of the accident.

Testimony was presented to show that Mrs. Hill had declined in weight from 165 pounds at the time of the crash, to 139 pounds at the present time, and that she was now unable to perform household and farm tasks as previously.

Dr. Hayes testified that in his opinion, her present weight of 139 pounds was more desirable than 165 pounds, and more near her proper weight. The plaintiff's counsel held this was right weight reduction and questioned Dr. Hayes at some length on the medical angles involved.

It was brought out that Mrs. Hill, before the accident, performed her housework, tended to the chickens and turkeys, looked after numerous details of farm home, and, when emergency arose, "had even gone into the field and pitched hay," none of which she was now able to do.

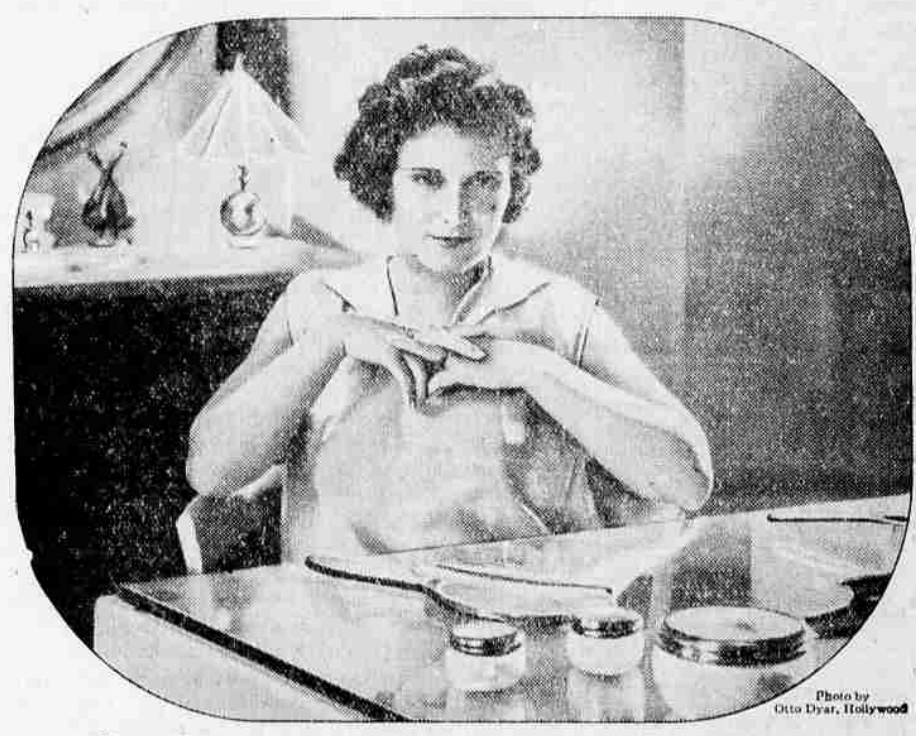
CHOICE CITY LOTS FIND PURCHASERS

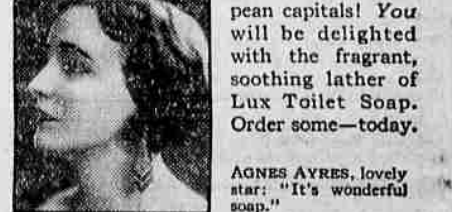

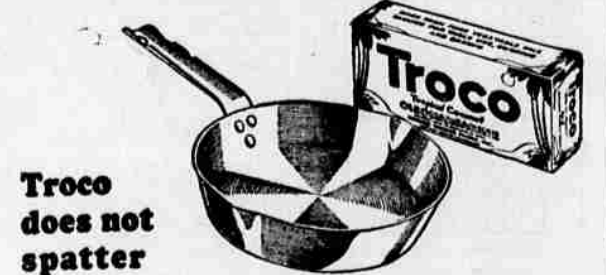
