

MEDFORD GIVEN GOOD BASEBALL BY COURT HALL

Never Had Poor Team Is Boast of Veteran Sportsman—Boys Were Good 23 Years Ago.

Twenty-three years ago Medford had a ball team managed by myself that won 30 games out of 31 played.
We had a pitcher named Coleman, from Chehalis, whom Pearl Casey released when Casey's Colts trained here for the Northwest league. Coleman was only a fair pitcher, but had wonderful control. Among the boys still living here who were on the team, are "Pug" Isaacs, Shorty Miles, Walt Antle and Johnny Wilkinson.
The team was great on defense, but not a particularly hard-hitting club. When this team got off one or two runs in the lead, they felt that the game was theirs. Many of the games were of low score and went extra innings.
Many arguments have come up lately as to what year was the best team I ever managed, or a comparison of the teams in the past and at the present time. In all my experience in baseball I don't remember of ever giving Medford a poor ball club.

All Good Teams
I had so many good teams that it is impossible for me to really pick out the best. The lively ball at the present time, makes it rather hard to make a comparison. I never care if a player makes an occasional error, if only he can hit the old balls. What I dislike more than anything, is poor base running, and that is the weak spot of our present team.
The fault must be improved in next Sunday's game if we expect to beat Klamath Falls.

I know the boys can hit, but come from three to five runs per game by poor base running is too much of a handicap for any team to always overcome.
The Klamath Falls ball team plays scientific ball, and is probably the best ball club ever organized in this city. They have two good pitchers in Beck and Hilton, but no better than Cliff Best, especially on a warm day. Our boys will have to play good ball in order to win Sunday.

Should Be Good
The game should be a corker. For once it looks like there is going to be a big crowd. The Pelicans are bringing along a big bunch of Elk fans to root for them. Every Elk belonging to the Medford lodge is expected to attend the game, if possible. The American Legion and other clubs of the city are boosting Sunday's game and are going to give the boys a big turnout.

ASSOCIATION AIDS DEVELOPMENT OF CRESCENT HARBOR

Crescent City has three newspapers and its population has shown a decided increase during the past ten years. Located on the ocean, it is the destination of many week-end auto parties from Medford and an average warm Sunday always finds Medford well represented on its beaches.

BLIND COMMITTEE OF LIONS CLUB IS THANKED FOR AID

Report of the blind committee, composed of Lions Hoffman, Newberry and Isaacs, given at the noon luncheon of the Lions club at Hotel Medford today shows a remarkable amount of work done for the benefit of the blind during the past year.
Since June, 1929, the club has purchased and installed for the use of blind persons two loud speaker radios, making a total of three such sets now being maintained for this purpose in the vicinity of Medford. A speaker set was also purchased and installed for a woman near Rogue River, who recently lost her sight, funds for this purchase being furnished by her son. These sets have been kept in order, and have been a source of untold comfort and enjoyment to their users, according to the committee's report.

Three pieces of needlecraft made by blind persons have been sold by the club, the proceeds amounting to \$28.55. Transportation has been furnished several blind persons for visits with friends and attendance at hand concerts. Recitation fees were paid for a blind girl's entrance as a student at the University of Oregon.
An individual census of all blind persons in Jackson county was taken at the request of the state organization in Portland.

A mileage total of 625 miles was announced by the committee in carrying on the activities listed.

Lions Pennington, Isaacs and Trowbridge and their respective business establishments were praised by the committee for their generosity in furnishing radio supplies at liberal discounts. Vert Walker of Palmer's Music store was also commended for time and mileage given the club in servicing radio sets, and Fred W. Payne of the post office staff for helping keep the battery for a set charged.

The committee's report was submitted to the club by Lion Newberry, chairman, and was followed by a vote of thanks.

PARK STAFF GOES TO SUMMER CAMP FOR SEASON DUTY

This is the last day until late next fall for the Crater Lake National park winter headquarters in Medford, for tomorrow forenoon the books, records and other equipment of the offices in the federal building will be moved up to the park headquarters at government camp.

Although the official Crater Lake season will not begin until July 1, the tourists and other visitors are coming to the park in increasing number, and the work of preparation for the official opening and for the big road, trail and other improvement work which will be begun as soon as the snow passes away, necessitates the moving of the park offices in Medford to the national park at this time.

Of interest in Crater Lake history is the following in today's Oregonian:

"A photograph taken at the first flag raising in Crater Lake national park in 1903 was brought to Portland yesterday by M. F. McCowan of Mohalla and presented to Phil Metchan, president of the Imperial Hotel company. The photograph shows Mr. Metchan's father and Senator Charles Fulton lifting their hats as the flag ascended the staff. Mr. McCowan was a member of the party which surveyed the park for the government. He was present at the flag raising, which took place in July, 1903."

"Guilty" Opens Run at Fox Craterian
