LAKE ATTRACTING LOCAL MOTORISTS

Lake of the Woods indicates it to be a big attraction for week-end recreationists, quite a number of whom are planning to leave for the lake tomorrow morning. The resort is now open and there is a sufficient supply of boats and cabins to provide for all needs, according to local reports today. The coffee shop is serving lunches and meals and the store is fully stocked to supply any demand.

Fishing is reported to be good and the silverside and bass are said to be caught easily. Several good catches were made last Sunday.

The best route to the lake is deplanned to be by the way of Anna Springs and Fort Klamath, entailing a distance of 124 miles and can be driven in four hours. The second best route is given by way of Klamath Falls, 116 miles, or four hours from Medford. The Dead Indian route, from the Pacific highway, is in fair condition and can be driven in three and one-half hours.
