

DU BUQUE BUYS BOLDS ORCHARD AT CENTRAL PT.

Former Conro Fiero Property and Green Acres Farm Involved in \$60,000 Transaction.

Purchase of the Woodlawn orchard, best known as the former Conro Fiero home, northeast of Central Point by H. A. DuBuque of Seven Oaks from C. E. Bolds, a deal involving \$60,000, was announced yesterday afternoon following completion of the sale thru the C. R. Beebe and C. W. Babl real estate agency of this city.

The Woodlawn orchard, one of the most fertile orchard properties of the Rogue River valley, as well as one of the most beautiful homes in southern Oregon, includes 40 acres of land, all in orchard, including peaches and apples, half of which is in bearing, and an attractive nine room house. As part payment for the property Mr. DuBuque is exchanging the Green Acres farm in the Seven Oaks district, where he is now making his home. He expects to take possession of Woodlawn orchard at an early date.

Green Acres farm includes 44 acres of land, 19 of which are planted to young orchard. It is also one of the scenic homes of the valley and was formerly owned by the Eldons.

The Woodlawn orchard is known by all people who travel the road from Central Point across Bear creek to Hybee bridge or the Crater Lake highway for its beautiful and spacious grounds, reflecting from the high hedge at the road to the large rambling country house, surrounded by well kept shrubs and flowers.

Constructed by Mr. Fiero during the days of the apple boom, when easterners were swarming to the Rogue River valley and sparing no expense in the building of beautiful homes, nothing has been eliminated, which might add to the comfort and romance of the place. It is modernly equipped with large basement and furnace as well as several fireplaces on the main floor.

French doors lead from the living room into the court yard behind the house, which is as attractive as the front lawn.

The nine rooms include quarters for servants and the house has always been the scene of much entertaining.

Mr. and Mrs. DuBuque will take possession of the place soon. No announcement was made yesterday as to Mr. and Mrs. Bolds' plans for the immediate future.

"The general's name will be entered for the Republican primaries and if he is determined to ignore our wishes, he will have until July 2 to withdraw his name," said A. A. Muegadis, a leader in the "draft" movement, replying to dispatches from Paris where Pershing reiterated his determination to stay out of Nebraska politics.

Petitions are in circulation, Muegadis related, and a "Pershing-for-Senator" headquarters has been established.
