the bugle by Wilson F. Waite, Elks band director, ended the ceremonies and when the last plaintive note had died away on the quiet air, the parade moved back to the park, with the bands playing a lively march. Most of the spectators at the bridge followed the procession to the scene of the remainder of the forenoon's program, to be followed this afternoon by the decoration of graves of soldier dead.

Woods, Chairman.
J. C. Woods, vice-commander of Chester A. Arthur post, Grand Army of the Republic, acted as chairman, in the absence of Commander Lyman, at the program held in the city park following the parade. Representatives of all patriotic organizations were seated on the platform as well as other persons appearing on the program. Invocation was given by Rev. Carman E. Mell.

Judge Colvig, adjutant of the post, read a group of orders, including General Logan's first Memorial Day General Order. The Gettysburg address was then given by William Dougherty, orator of the Medford high school.

Decorate Chairs.
Decoration of vacant chairs by representatives of organizations in memory of the departed veterans was the next thing on the program. In the impressive ceremony Judge Colvig placed a wreath for the unknown soldier. Mrs. B. G. Harding represented the D. A. R., Mrs. R. A. Cornwell the Civil War veterans, Mrs. Clay the W. R. C., Mrs. George Nelson, Daughters of Union Veterans; Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Alden, Spanish War Veterans and auxiliary; W. S. Bolger, American Legion, and Mrs. Wm. Lee Bricker, the Women's Auxiliary of the Legion.

Eloquent Memorial Address.
"Forgetting all the injustices and sinister motives behind a war, forgetting for a moment that almost entirely is a war not of the common people; forgetting all these and other things that lie back of war, we come to give entire honor to our soldier dead for the sole fact that they believed in something that prompted them to give even to the offering of their lives"—with this message Rev. Claude B. Porter of the First Presbyterian church opened his address this forenoon before the large assembly of people gathered in the city park to observe another Memorial day.

"It was in 1863 that General Logan, then commander of the G. A. R., designated May 30th, the date on which the last of the volunteers were mustered out, as Decoration day, as it is more properly called. Since then have come the wars of 1898 and 1917 and today we honor not only those whose ranks are now much thinned, those boys of '61, but also those of all wars of our country," Rev. Porter continued.

Honor to Soldiers.
"Despite the criminalities that lie back of war, we can without the least believing or commending war give unstinted praise and honor to those men and boys who so willingly and courageously faced almost certain tragedy of life and left family and loved ones to accomplish a certain purpose which they believed to be right."

"Eliminating the ulterior motives that may lie back of the wars, thinking only of the thing which prompted men down through the history of the United States to offer their lives, Rev. Porter reviewed the different wars in which this nation has participated. The sacrifice they made is a challenge to people today, he pointed out, to achieve a freedom of peace equally important as that obtained physically by war.

Stand for Freedom.
"We must take a stand for freedom today in some ways where freedom does not entirely exist," he stated and enumerated a need for freedom of personality. "The right to lead a life free from domination of others. A need for political freedom, economic freedom, social and spiritual freedom." "And last, but most important, we must demand a freedom for posterity," he added. "We must work for parents who will be parents, who do not expect their children for personal or petty ends. Who will build character rather than social prestige. We must have parents who will lead their children rather than drive them, to high idealism.

Challenge Seen.
"Memorial day is simply a mawkish sentiment and shallow pretense unless we are willing to accept the challenge to continue the same spirit of desire as did the men of all wars. We may be proud that our major wars were not those of conquest but defense of idealism, a desire for freedom." He stated in conclusion: "Let us never be accused of any false sentiment but, on the contrary, let us logically support the sentiment of today by an aggressive determination to keep our land free from all danger, civic and national, in these days of peace."

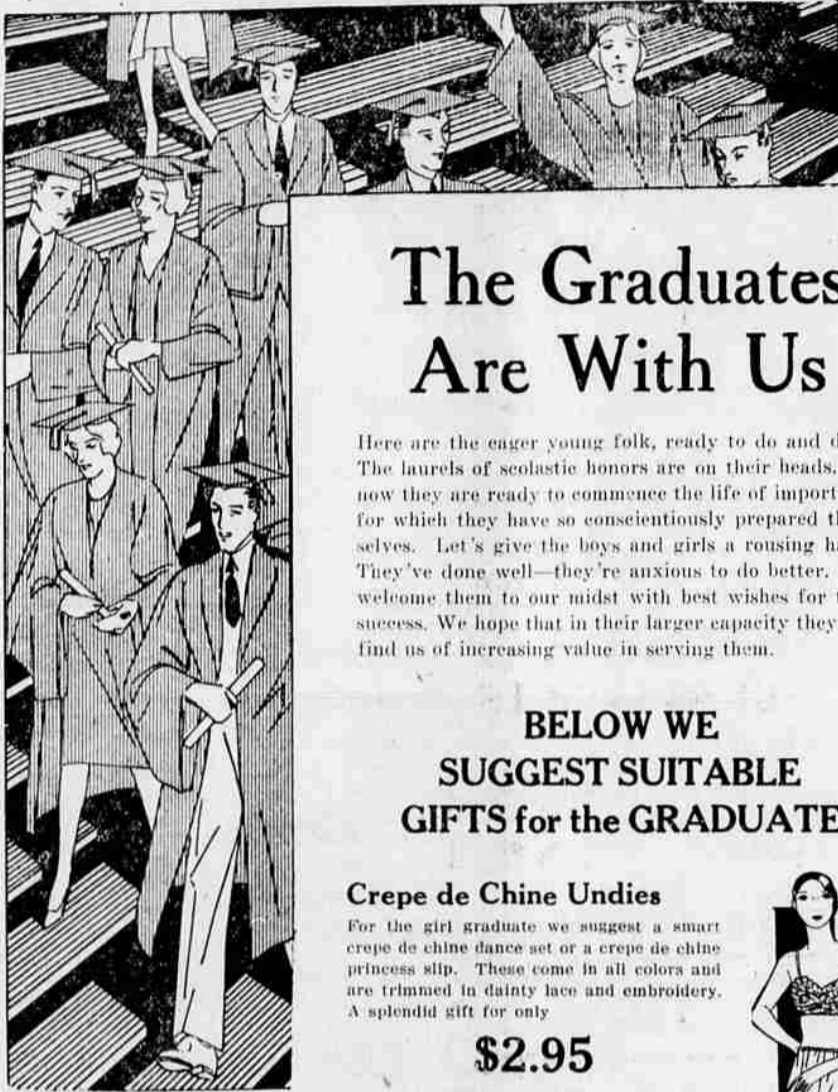
