WASHINGTON TO LEAD NATION IN BOOZE SUPPORT

Former Non-Partisan Solon Sees Anti-Saloon League in Decline of Power in State.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 31.—(AP)—Judge George Turner said today that "Washington will lead the nation in a release of anti-prohibition sentiment and the anti-saloon league has reached the twilight of its power," as a result of the Republican state convention at Bellingham last week. Turner was formerly non-partisan senator from Washington, a Democratic candidate for governor in 1904, a district judge, and in days gone by he helped write the constitution of this state and was one of the adjudicators of the Canadian boundary line. It was not known whether he spoke only for himself or for part of an eastern Washington wet faction.

Convention Points Way. "The east has always considered Washington a rabidly dry state," he said, in a formal statement, "and the action by this convention is bound to point the way for other political units." "It is alleged that sharp practices were used at the convention to get an expression (favoring a wet plank) but when a strong minority has been wielding the whip for 10 years, terrorizing political aspirants, the expediency of permitting an expression of sentiment without danger of political suicide seems justified.
