Old English Dessert  
2 cups jam, 1 cup rice, 3 to 3½ cups boiling milk, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ cup powdered sugar, ½ cup cream.

Add salt to milk and place in top of boiler. When the boiling point is reached, add rice and cook until tender (30 to 45 minutes). Drain, sweeten with powdered sugar, and pour into ring mold to set. When ready to serve, turn out carefully on large plate. Fill center with jam, and garnish with whipped cream.

Ripe plum jam, cherry jam, or cranberry marmalade make excellent fillings.

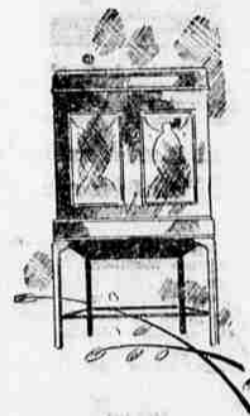

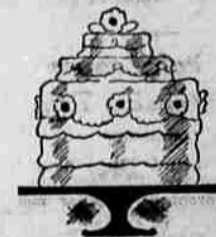
