## OREGON SECOND AS HUSKY WINS NO'WEST MEET

### Pullman Track Sea of Mud—Trojans Score Decisive Victory Over Stanford in National Events.

ROGERS FIELD, PULLMAN, Wash., May 31.—(AP)—Competing under probably the worst conditions in the history of Pacific coast conference track meets, the University of Washington successfully defended its championship today, scoring 56 2-5 points.

All six teams of the northern division of the conference finished the same as last year.

The University of Oregon, which conquered the Washington Huskies in a dual meet two weeks ago, piled up 43 8-15 points to finish second. Washington State College scored 37 9-18; Oregon State College, 13 1-6; Idaho 10, and Montana, 4.

On a half mile track covered with over an inch of mud, the majority of favorites in the dash and running events slipped and skidded to victory but their times never even threatened records.

Two new northern division meets were written in the record books in the field events, when Homer Hein of Washington State hurled the javelin 195 feet 3 3/4 inches, and Bobby Robinson, Oregon negro pole vaulted 13 feet 1 3/4 inches.

Robinson's vault broke Eldon Jenne's ten-year-old mark of 13 feet, 1 inch. Jenne made his record in 1920 on the same field.

Whitlock of Oregon held the former javelin throw with a distance of 194 feet, 5 inches.

The mile run, the most talked about race of the meet, proved a thriller from start to finish, but the time was slow on account of the miserable track.

Ralph Hill, Oregon farmer youth who hopes to be a school teacher some day, and Rufus Kiser of Washington, former national inter-collegiate champion, had been figured to put on a 9:05 1/2 by the world's record race in the mile event, but the sloppy track made it impossible for them to show their stuff.

Kiser upset the dope to win the race from the Webfooter, who two weeks ago beat him in a dual meet in a record inter-collegiate performance.

The Washington runner took the lead and ran Hill into the ground in the final 100-yard sprint.

Kiser broke the tape about eight yards in front of him. His time was 4:23.8, compared with Hill's new record of 4:12.4. The former mark of 4:14.4 was set by John Paul Jones of Cornell 17 years ago.

HARVARD STADIUM, CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 31.—(AP)—The southern all-around strength of Southern California's Trojans triumphed over the individual brilliance of Stanford's Cardinals, defending title holders, today, and swept them to victory in the 54th intercollegiate A. A. A. track and field championships, a sensational battle featured by the greatest collection of performances in the history of the classic.

Three records were shattered and a fourth equaled in the two-day struggle as the two Pacific coast rivals staged a spectacular fight for team honors. For a time Hayward unexpectedly made it a three-cornered affair with a surprising show of strength, but the crimson was unable to keep the pace all the way.

Scoring in 11 of the 15 finals the Stanford band of 18 U. S. C. men rolled up the impressive score of 44 1/2. This was enough to give them an eight-point margin over Stanford, which finished with 36 1/2 as the Cardinals yielded the crown they had worn for the past three years. Harvard finished third with 22 1/2 points; Michigan, fourth, with 14 1/2, as the Wolverines participated for the first time since 1919, and Yale fifth, with 12 1/2.

Stanford with her twin stars, Eric Krenz and Harlow Robert, in rare form, furnished most of the record-breaking thrills. The Cards also led in first place, collecting four titles, and U. S. C. took two right down the line. The Trojans had too much all-around strength and clinched the meet with a burst as Bill Carlis and Ed Payne ran one-two in the 220-yard low hurdles.

Robert's marvelous heave of 52 feet, 3 1/2 inches, in the shotput trials, beating his former meet mark and also surpassing the American record, withstood further attack today to give him his second successive championship in the event. He was joined by Eric Krenz in a record-breaking success in most competitions as Krenz hurled the discus to a new mark of 159 feet, 9 1/2 inches. Krenz had achieved 163 feet 8 inches, the day before, but this was not allowed because the wind helped.

## AIR RACER FLITS 164.08 M. PER HR.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(AP)—Carrying the colors of the Marines alone against 23 navy pilots, Captain Arthur Page today swept to a new race record of 164.08 miles an hour and won the Curtiss marine trophy.

Captain Page used the same plane in which Major C. A. Lutz, the only other Marine to win the trophy in 11 years of competition, speeded to victory in 1928.

The ship had been re-streamlined and skimming low over the Potomac to take advantage of a heavier cushion of air and turning short on the pylons, Page was able to add 6 1/2 miles an hour to Lutz' speed.

The former race record was established last year by Lieutenant W. G. Tomlinson who averaged 162 miles an hour in a ship with a special cowling, which was outlawed in today's race.

## STATERS LOSE ON DIAMOND, 8 TO 3

CORVALLIS, May 31.—(AP)—The University of Oregon baseball team defeated Oregon State, 8 to 3, here today in the last game of the state championship series. Oregon State won the series of four games, three to one.

Oregon today played an errorless game and collected 14 hits, while the Staters lost the ball for eight errors.

Oregon State has won 11 games and lost 5, and as a result placed second in the conference.

## HIGHEST GLORIES OF GOLF BELONG TO BOBBY JONES

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 31.—(AP)—Bobby Jones today completed his golfing diadem by winning the British amateur championship which he has long coveted, by a convincing defeat of Roger Wethered, 7 up and 6 to play, in the 36-hole final.

All the jewels of golf have sparkled from Bobby's crown now. He is the only man who has ever won the open and amateur titles of both the United States and Great Britain.

They gave him the cup on the terrace of the Royal and Ancient clubhouse this evening with all the patriarchs of golf gathered.

The final between Jones and Wethered, with 12,000 persons trying to see the shots, was the climax of a great week of golf in fine bracing Scotch weather and with enthusiastic galleries trailing over the famous links where putts have been missed for 500 years.

Nearly 300 matches have been played this week—all free, for St. Andrews is a public course and there is no admission fee. Never have the golf loving Scots had such a good time as they have watching Jones climb, round by round, over Englishmen, Scotsmen and Americans, including the amateur champions of Great Britain and the United States, and the captain of the British Walker cup team as a final opponent.

Wethered was a worthy opponent and great sportsman. Although the tide was against him all the way, he never seemed worried or hurried and played his normal game, which was good, but not good enough.

Jones played 30 holes in two under fours and there is the story of the 1930 British amateur final.

## FRANK DOLP IS WINNER O'ER KIN FOR STATE TITLE

EUGENE, Ore., May 31.—(AP)—For the third time in five years, Frank Dolp, Alderwood country club, Portland, today won the Oregon State Amateur Golf championship when he defeated his brother Vincent, 4 and 2.

Frank had little trouble with his younger brother, holding a margin of 6 up at the end of the first 18 holes. During the afternoon he increased his lead to 7 up at one time but Vincent came back to cut the lead to four.

Frank shot an even par 72 over the difficult course during the morning round.

Frank first won the Oregon title in 1925 and again in 1926.

## HORNSBY WINS MOST VALUABLE PLAYER AWARD

### Crippled Star of Chicago Cubs Honored For Second Time—Spirit of Fiery 'Rajah' Praised, As Throng Cheers.

CHICAGO, May 31.—(AP)—Roger Hornsby, the "wounded in action hero" of the championship Cubs, hobbled into Wrigley field supported by crutches today to receive the National league's most valuable player award for the second time.

Thirty thousand fans, most of whom saw the famous "Rajah" hobble his left ankle while sliding to third base in yesterday morning's game with the St. Louis Cardinals, stood during the presentation ceremony and gave a tumultuous cheer. It was a little solace anyway for Hornsby who will be out of the game six weeks or more.

President John Heydler of the National league presided at the brief ceremony which was held before the game between the Cardinals and Cubs. He handed the rajah \$1,000 in gold and lauded him not only for his baseball playing ability but for his spirit, one of the big factors that enabled the Cubs to win the National league pennant last year. James "Crusenberg" president of the Baseball Writers' association of America, who made the award, also praised the rajah and presented him with a bronze plaque.

"This award is made to you," Heydler told Hornsby, "not only because you are a great baseball player and invaluable, but because you possess the spirit that makes a great baseball player. We all would prefer to give you a good leg but this may be of some solace. Get up and around in a hurry. We need men like you in this game."

Thus the player who most baseball critics predicted would ruin instead of help the Cubs in 1929 because of his "fiery temperament" heard himself lauded and signalled as the most valuable man to his club in 1929.

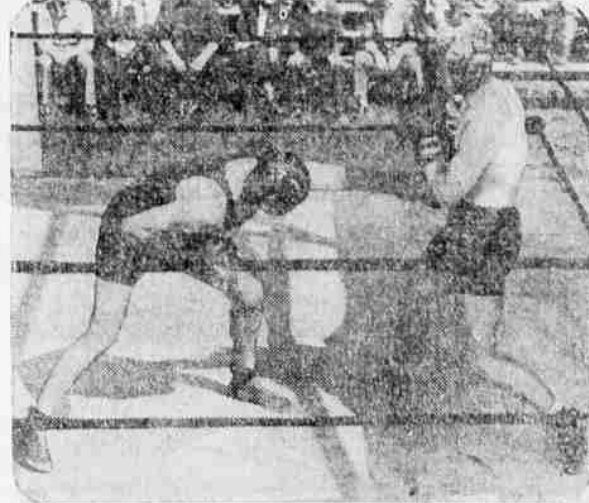

Interest is continuing to grow in the world's championship tennis match at the armory tomorrow evening between Yaqui Joe, Sonora, Mexico, Indian and Henry Jones, Provo, Utah, title holder. Jones has a good chance of losing the belt now on display at Brown's and is determined to take two straight falls from the challenger.

Herb Owen, promoter, has the following to say concerning the bout:

Yaqui Joe came to Oregon last year unknown and now is the greatest drawing card in the country. When up here before he wrestled Willard Pote before one of the largest houses ever drawn and in a red hot battle Joe, who apparently all in same old and gave Pote the prettiest "Sobonbor" I have ever seen, and thereby winning the belt. There never was a prouder Indian than Joe that night. Since then however, he had lost it and it has come home to Henry Jones and the reason for Joe's trip was to get a chance at that belt. Just after his match in Medford Joe went to Yakima and there wrestled before a big house, winning the match to the delight of the great crowd of Indians who attended in full force. Joe has been taking 10 miles of road work every morning and the way he runs them is beautiful to see. In the evening he takes a good hard workout and in a warm bath to loosen up his muscles. There is nothing slow about Joe and he trains had all the time. Henry Jones had a whip wrist lock that just turns a man right on his head and boy how it hurts. I have seen him throw a man, keep right about of the wrist, pull him up and throw him again, pull up and throw him again for two or three times more and by that time he looks like a rat doll that has been thrown around by a terrier. The first time he and Joe met Joe said "no go" but when the first fall came Jones put that old wrist lock on and turned Joe right on his head with a pop that you would have thought would have broken his neck. He pulled him to his feet and flayed him twice more and that was enough; he turned his shoulders to the mat and received the fall. Joe says that he "no more go" and true to his word Jones never got it the rest of the match although he tried for it. But there is no real defense for it and Jones is liable to get it any time and if he does, watch for a fall.

In the special event the popular Medford boy Ray Frisby, will meet Joe Gallagher of the town of Corvallis. Frisby is learning and practicing many new holds and soon it will be hard to get anybody who can beat him.
