CELEBRANTS LOSE BAIL MONEY WHEN FAIL TO APPEAR

A traveling salesman hailing from the northern part of the state and who gave his name as J. Smith, but thought by police to be an alias, forfeited \$75 cash bail put up at the police station yesterday when arrested on a charge of reckless driving, by failure to appear for hearing on that charge in city court today.

It appears that the Smith man, in an alleged inebriated condition, drove his car unceremoniously in the business district early Sunday morning, and got along all right until he nearly ran over Night Officer Bloom at 5 a. m. on West Main street in front of the Hotel Medford. Bloom at once placed him under arrest and a short time later he put up the \$75 cash bond.

Two other persons forfeited cash bail by failing to appear in court for trial this morning. They were Joe Bakke, who forfeited \$10 bail for his third intoxication arrest in a few weeks, and Mrs. Wm. Shannon, who forfeited a similar sum for her second arrest on an intoxication charge in two weeks.

MEDFORD SHOULD SUPPORT GUARDS AVERS TENGWALD

If Medford does not take greater interest in its two units of the Oregon National Guard, it is apt to lose both, Captain Carl Y. Tengwald told members of the Kiwanis club at luncheon at the Hotel Medford today. He declared interest in the home company has been waning and support of the activities of the local guardsmen has been slack to such an extent that headquarters officials have threatened to move the company to another location.

The company has much to offer. Boys in high school receive credits for membership, receive pay for attendance and learn other things in addition to military education. The government spends \$10,000 annually on the companies in Medford and each year spends \$200 per man to send him to the annual encampment at Camp Clatsop on the coast. Eight more men are needed to fill the ranks, Captain Tengwald said.
