Subordinate Granges in Pennsylvania sponsored the publication of an attractive cook book and raised thereby hundreds of dollars which were applied towards the fund for erecting a girls' dormitory at the State college, occupied for the first time this season.

Wisconsin Grange members derive large cash benefits each year through the purchase of big quantities of binder twine, fertilizer, grass seed, salt and other supplies, the business being done through a central purchasing agency directed by state Grange officials.

The organization of juvenile Granges has begun in Minnesota and the movement is attracting much attention in the rural neighborhoods. Taking the country over, there are now more active juveniles than ever before in the history of the Grange.

The oldest subordinate Grange in California has just celebrated its 57th birthday and has the enviable record of never having skipped one of its regular meetings in 57 years, although these are held every Saturday afternoon in the year.

One of the youngest Grange lecturers in the United States lives in Maine, a young woman just past 18 years of age, who is lecturer of a large subordinate unit in that state and in that position is proving herself a successful community leader.

A Grange near Watertown, New York, boasts the possession of two members, both still active and usually present at Grange meetings, who are 94 and 97 years old respectively.

In Massachusetts the Grange annually sponsors a state-wide bird day, to which people come from all over the state. Bird walks, lectures, demonstrations, etc., make up a day of exceptional value.

The National Grange is represented in the "American Business Men's Prohibition Foundation," recently established with thousands of business men on its membership roll, by Louis J. Tabor, the Grange organization head of the country. From every angle the Grange is one of the most pronounced dry organizations in the United States.

**BARBER BOARD TO PAY 10 PER CENT**

SALEM, Ore., June 3.—(P)—The state board of barber examiners is required by law to pay only 10 per cent of its receipts into the general fund of the state, says an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle to Secretary of State Hoss.

An act of 1929 provides that the receipts of all boards and officers shall be paid into the general fund for the credit of the department making the contribution, the state fair board being the only exception.

An act of 1927 provides that in the case of the barber board only 10 per cent shall be paid in, the remaining 90 per cent being retained to pay salaries and expenses of the board.

**CALIFORNIA FRUIT RATES SET ASIDE BY COURT RULING**

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(P)—Reduced railroad rates ordered by the interstate commerce commission on deciduous fruits shipped out of California, were set aside today by the supreme court.

The Hook-Smith resolution in which congress ordered reduced rates to aid depressed agricultural products was involved in the decision. The court ruled that lowering of rates without regard to existing laws had not been authorized by the resolution. It held that the resolution should not be given the construction that the commission had placed on it.

**POLICEMAN SLAIN IN INVESTIGATION OF NOISY PARTIES**

ABSECON, N. J., June 2.—(P)—Chief of police William M. Schoetflin, 41, of Absecon, was shot and killed early today, when he was mistaken for an intruder while investigating an alleged disorderly house.

George Howard Much, 31, of Ventnor, N. J., was arrested, charged with the shooting. Three others, including two women, were held as material witnesses.

In a statement to police, Much said he had recently rented the place for a summer home. Early today he heard a knock at the door and then saw it opened by a man in civilian clothes. Fearing the man to be a robber, he said he fired a shot with the intention of scaring him off, only to see Schoetflin fall dead.

Police said several complaints had been received about parties held in the place recently.

State troopers found the chief's body when they went to the place in response to an anonymous telephone call.

**AIR FERRIES LAND ON FLOATING ISLE**

SAN FRANCISCO—(P)—A seadrome built on the principles of proposed mid-sea landing places for airplanes, has been put in service by a San Francisco bay air ferry service.

It is 100 feet wide, and declared to be the smallest floating island landing place in the country.

Shaped like an inverted saucer, the landing contrivance has a smooth rounded top and beneath its hull is a system of air tanks which may be regulated to control the depth and angle at which the device floats.

The artificial island idea is carried out with sand on the inclines to prevent the amphibians from skidding. The sand is cemented into float.

The float is anchored at the end of a dock where more than 55 landings a day are made with a similar number of take-offs.

**START CONSTRUCTION THREE NEW CRUISERS**

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(P)—Secretary Adams said today that keels for three new 10,000 ton cruisers, construction of which was ordered stopped by President Hoover shortly before the naval conference would be laid soon.

The cruisers are to be built in the Philadelphia, Puget Sound and New York navy yards.
