EGGS STRONGER IN PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3.—(AP)—Eggs and butter prices continue unchanged, with the undertone without strength. Egg values appear to be the stronger of the two, with the cooperatives holding the situation well in hand.

Although strawberry supplies were present in moderate volume, canners and barrellers requirements took most offerings, with resultant sharp price advances on the wholesale market. First early sales on the farmers market were made as low as \$1.75 per crate, but retailers paid up to \$3, later in the day.

It now appears that the barrellers will act as a decided stabilizing influence during the rest of the season, as their requirements are not nearly filled yet. Cantaloupes weakened about 25 cents per crate.

PORTLAND VOTING ON SPECIAL SCHOOL TAX

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3.—(AP)—Portland voters today were voting on the customary special school tax levy and to fill three positions on the board of directors. Polls opened at noon and remain open until 8 o'clock tonight.

The amount to be raised by the tax levy has been fixed at \$1,575,000, which is in excess of the amount raised under the limitations of the 6 per cent constitutional provision.

LANGLEY FIELD, Va.—(AP)—A new five-foot vertical wind tunnel in the laboratory of the national advisory committee for aeronautics is the only one of its kind in the United States. It was constructed for studying spinning characteristics of various types of wing models.

Seattle Air Line Oldest

SEATTLE—(AP)—An air mail route between Victoria, B. C., and Seattle is the oldest privately operated air line in the United States and one of the shortest airways in the world over which foreign mail is flown. In 11 years it has clung to the same type of equipment.

KINCAID DECISION GIVEN BY COURT

The decision today of the supreme court in the case of the State vs. Luke Kincaid in nowise alters the present status of the dance dance hall case, viz: the right of Kincaid to hold dances.

The decision today was upon strictly constitutional points, advanced by Attorney Don R. Newbury.

In a previous decision the supreme court reversed the decision of Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, denying the right of Kincaid to hold dances under certain conditions.

The decision today ends the legal phase of the case.

KING IDENTIFIED IN MURDER TRIAL

EUREKA, Cal., June 3.—(AP)—William Martell, principal state witness in the murder trial of Clarence L. King, charged with slaying Minnie McCoy, his common law wife, today identified the young ex-convict as the man he saw arguing with Mrs. McCoy near where her body was later found hidden behind a redwood log in northern Humboldt county.

McCoy said he saw King and the girl quarreling twice on Feb. 20, the day she was killed, once at 2 p. m. and again at 5 p. m.
