POSTAL RECEIPTS FOR LAST MONTH SHOW GOOD GAIN

The postoffice financial receipts of last month totaled \$7986.61, as against receipts of \$6,813.08, a gain of \$273.53, or 4 per cent for the same month last year, upholding the habit formed by the Medford postoffice years ago of a gain each month over the same month of the preceding year. The receipts for May, 1928, were \$6496.25.

A better illustration of the continuation of the steady substantial growth so far this year is that the total receipts for the first five months of this year were \$40,614.29, in comparison with the receipts of the first five months of last year, which were \$36,406.70, a gain of \$4207.59, or 11 per cent. This noted increase from month to month for years past is due to the steadily increasing business and growth of the city, and not to any outstanding feature except general progress, although the locating here of the district office of the Standard Oil company aided somewhat in increasing the receipts of the past few months.

HOME PRODUCT TALKS ENGAGE ROTARY LUNCH

Home products held the center of the program at the noon luncheon of the Rotary club at Hotel Medford today. James Lively, the chairman of the program committee, called upon the heads of various industries, who outlined interesting sidelights of their business formerly unknown to members of the club.

Sam Warner, president of the co-operative cheese factory, gave a resume of the accomplishments of the group which is sponsoring this new industry at Central Point. Manufacture of cheese in this locality will mean an increase of business for everyone, Mr. Warner stated, as there is under present conditions not a sufficient demand for the milk produced by the 8000 cows located here.

While the country was being praised for its products and industries, Wm. Allen was called upon to tell about Rotary itself. He traced the growth of the organization and gave the members the idea of the program to be held at the meeting of Rotary International in Chicago, at which a prince of the royal house of Japan will be in attendance.

Lumberman Talks. Problems of the lumber industry and the need of a tariff to cut down the amount of imported lumber which is offering unfair competition for local producers were emphasized by Paul Smith.

Mr. Lively then traced his own line from the quarrying of the lime to the manufacture of the finished products put out by the lime company. A. A. A story of a blighted romance was revealed in circuit court this morning when Mrs. Wilmina Barr, 22, asked for, and received, an annulment of her marriage last December to one John Barr, 35, a cook, alleged to have seven wives, and twice that many aliases. The present whereabouts of Barr are unknown and to his other alleged derelictions he added desertion.

The last heard of Barr he had purchased a round-trip stage ticket to Yreka, Cal., and has never returned.

The wife alleged that her husband had married six other women besides herself, one being a Mrs. Jack McDaniel of Tacoma, Wash. An acquaintance of Barrs, who knew him before he came to this city, where he was employed as a cook, told the wife's relatives of his perfidy, and when apparently substantiated, legal steps were taken.

Charges will probably be filed against Barr when apprehended.
