

SAMUELS IS NAMED FOR TREASURER

Resignation of Berrian Accepted Without Debate By City Council — Miss Murphy to Supervise City Playground—Open Street

The city council last night chose Gus Samuels, former city treasurer, as the new city treasurer, to replace H. J. Berrian, whose resignation from that office to enter some other line of business was related in yesterday's Mail Tribune, and whose resignation will take effect July 1st, appointed a new supervisor for the public playgrounds, opened a number of bids for street improvements, approved of the opening of Pennsylvania avenue, awarded contracts for purchasing 1100 feet of fire hose, and transacted much routine business, in addition to acting on important matters related elsewhere in this paper.

There was no debate whatever on the city treasurer change. C. A. Meeker made a motion that Mr. Berrian's resignation be accepted, which was promptly done, following the seconding of the motion by Eugene Thorndyke. Then Acting Mayor E. M. Wilson appointed Gus Samuels to fill the position until January, when Mr. Berrian's term expires. This appointment was confirmed.

Miss Murphy Named
The appointment of Miss Gladys Murphy, a graduate of the Medford high school and who will graduate from the Ashland normal school in a week, as supervisor of the playgrounds, is generally commended as a good one, as the well known local young lady is regarded as well qualified in general attainments and temperament for the position. The position is only a summer one for three months at \$100 per month salary. The playgrounds season will be inaugurated as soon as Miss Murphy graduates from the normal school, by which time the weather will have become settled.

There were five bidders from the Pacific coast on the 1100 feet of new fire hose, to meet the Fire Underwriters specifications, and the council voted to purchase 900 feet of Goodrich hose from the Howard Cooper company of Portland, and 300 feet of the American Rubber company hose, from Hubbard Bros., local dealers.

Open Pennsylvania Avenue
In approving of the opening of Pennsylvania avenue, the council instructed City Attorney Farrell to get options on the purchase of property needed (one lot) for that opening.

Among street improvement bids opened last night were bids for paving of Florence, East Ninth, West Palm and Fourth streets and South Central avenue. There were three bidders, and bids were received for both concrete and black top.

Bids were also opened for the grading and graveling of a part of West Palm street, and for the construction of a trunk sewer in the Siskiyou Heights district. Resolutions were passed declaring intention to lay a four-inch water main in Glenn Oak court and for the grading and graveling of West Holly street.

much-needed improvements asked for. When the 12th street opening petition, now being circulated, is in, the council will formally approve the petition for the opening of 4th street, signed by about 200 property owners, which was submitted by James D. Bell at last night's meeting and is on 8th and 12th streets, and ask the public service commission to have a hearing on the three at the same time, with a view to ordering them in.

This procedure is in accord with the city planning commission's plan to ultimately do away with all dead-end streets of the city, especially through the business district, and would be a great boon to that district as well as the general development of the city.

Larry Schade, president of the commission, told the council last evening that the 12th street opening petition would soon be ready. New Cottage St. Bridge.

Another matter which may be submitted to the city's voters at next fall's election will be to vote bonds for a new modern bridge on Cottage street over Bear creek. The city council committee of streets and sewers, through its chairman, R. B. Hammond, outlined this plan at last night's meeting. This bridge is a badly needed improvement over the present improvised structure.

VOLUNTEERS OF AMERICA PLAN LOCAL BRANCH

National Philanthropic Society Will Establish Social Welfare Center in City for Area.

Plans for establishment of a social welfare center in this city by the Volunteers of America, national philanthropic society, were instituted today with arrival of Lt. Col. Jessie F. Stark, commander of the Oregon battalion, and her staff of seven workers from Portland, where the volunteers have carried on numerous welfare projects for the past 20 years.

Established in New York City in 1898, the work of this organization is known throughout the nation. In Portland the members maintain a home for deserted mothers and children; the "Bellingham club," financed as living quarters for girls who are without employment or working for very meager wages and sponsor hosts of other welfare projects.

Church and Sunday school services are conducted by the Volunteers there and arrangements will be made with the churches here to participate in activities.

Lt. Col. Stark hopes to establish a home for deserted women and children and other worthy persons in need of care in this city, to be known as the Emergency home.

An employment agency will be conducted at the welfare center here and a clothes shop opened where deserving persons without money will be given sufficient apparel.

The Medford headquarters will be the center of all activities carried on in southern Oregon. In the cities of Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Ashland. No post has been established in Oregon by the Volunteers at this time south of Portland.

It is the desire of the officials to organize the work throughout the southern part of the state as it has been done in Multnomah county, using Medford as the nucleus.

Kindergarten classes, sewing clubs, medical departments and playgrounds are among the other projects carried on in Portland. The third Sunday of each month services are conducted by the group at the state penitentiary. Other prison work such as providing for the wives and children of convicts is sponsored by the Volunteers.

New York City is at this time erecting a building at the cost of one-fourth million dollars in honor of General Ballington Booth, commander-in-chief of the organization, to express appreciation of the work, which has been accomplished there.

Progress of organization work here will be announced at an early date.

BURGLAR SUSPECT TRIAL UNDER WAY

Harold Cotter, a young man the sheriff's office says served a term in the Monroe, Wash., reformatory, went on trial in circuit court this morning, charged with burglarizing Brown's store at Eagle Point, on March 6 last. Ernest Eller, alleged companion of Cotter's on the criminal adventure, will go to trial tomorrow. He is at liberty on bonds furnished by his brother.

Shirts, socks, neckties and shoes Cotter is alleged to have stolen from the shelves of the establishment, and identified by W. H. Brown as goods similar to those handled by his firm.

Cotter will take the stand in his own behalf. He is defended by Attorney Frank P. Farrell.

Her decision is assumed to have been reached in anticipation of an interesting event in the Lindbergh family.

PRISONER SEEKS HABEAS CORPUS

A hearing was to be held this afternoon on a habeas corpus proceeding begun by Frank Ray, San Francisco, arrested here Saturday night, against Sheriff Ralph Jennings and Chief of Police McCredie. Ray was arrested on a charge of embezzlement brought against him by San Francisco authorities and was taken off a northbound stage when it reached Medford. Ray is seeking liberty through the proceedings to be underway this afternoon.

POSTAL CARRIERS ON HALF HOLIDAY EVERY SATURDAY

Every Saturday afternoon beginning with next Saturday, will be Sunday for the city carriers of the Medford postoffice, or rather another half-Sunday, for on Saturday will begin the half-holiday a week recently promulgated by the postoffice department for the clerks and carriers, which the clerks have been enjoying for about a month.

However, one carrier must remain on duty all day Saturday to look after emergency carrier work in delivering at the window mail matter carrier patrons call for. Inasmuch as there are eight carriers, this means that each carrier will only miss one half-day in eight weeks. The substitute carrier does not get the half holiday.

This boon is greatly appreciated by the carriers and it is being longingly looked forward to, as it, together with the regular Sunday lay-off, will enable them to properly look after their corns and bunions, and get their pedestrian equipment in first class condition for the next week's grind.

The unmarried clerks spend their half holidays in playing cat ball and in sticking up generally, and the married ones in going fishing and mowing the lawn, at which they are all very proficient.

ROSTEL AWARDED \$150 FOR CANINE

The jury in the damage action of Bert C. Rostel against J. G. Love, both of Central Point, was out only five minutes late yesterday afternoon before it returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, \$150 and costs. The plaintiff had sought \$500 for the killing of a Llewellyn setter dog by Mr. Love last April. The dog was valued as a hunting animal and a household pet.

The defendant claimed that the dog had chased wild game off his place and destroyed nests, but in testimony failed to prove any of his contentions. The plaintiff set forth that the animal was killed by Mr. Love without a complaint or warning that the dog had ever bothered him or his property. Inherent in the case was general.

J. Hanna, owner of Shorty's Lunch. Hence, unless some legitimate lunch rooms are opened at once it will be impossible to get a quick lunch in Bly unless visitors carry their own provender along.
