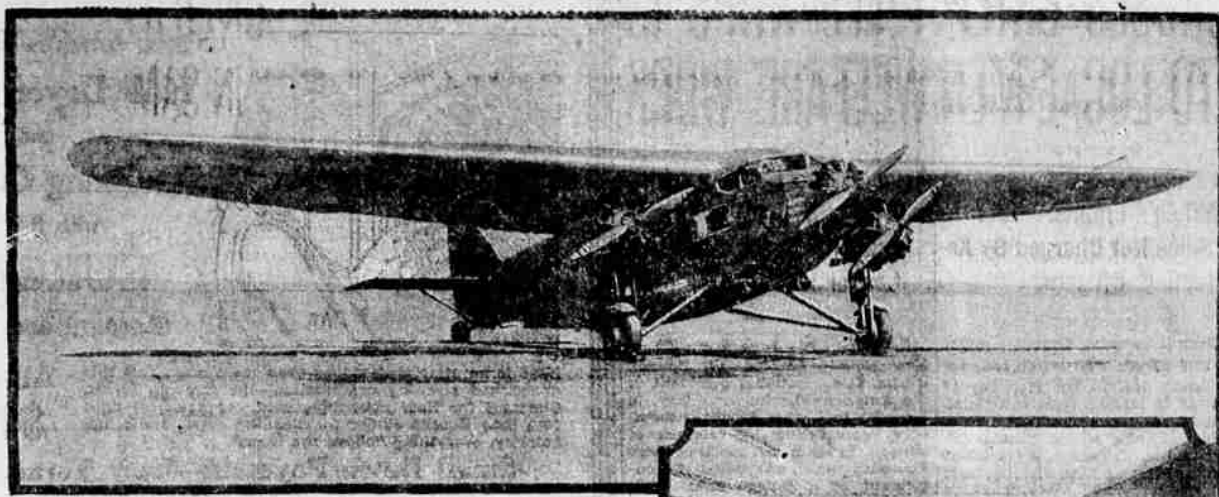


OFFICIAL LIST OF GRADUATES IS GIVEN OUT

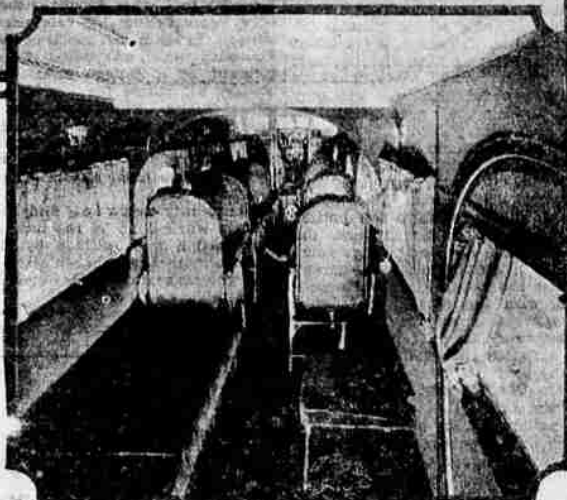

Bankers Will View Crater Lake From S. O. Plane

The big Standard Oil company tri-motored cabin plane will arrive in Medford late Saturday from San Francisco to be here during the officing of the state bankers' convention and to give bankers short scenic rides. While here, the ship may also make a flight over Crater Lake, taking newspapermen, local citizens and members of the airport committee. The Crater Lake trip will cover the same route as planned for the local aviation company about to be organized to take over airplane and school concessions at the airport.

The plane will take up bankers Sunday afternoon and Monday forenoon and will leave Monday for its southern headquarters. The ship has been here before and has flown over 13,000 miles without a mishap.

AUTO ASSOCIATION REFUSED LICENSE

SALEM, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Clare A. Lee, state insurance commissioner, with jurisdiction over motor vehicle service clubs, announced today that he has refused a license to the Pacific Coast Automobile Association of California to operate in Oregon. Lee said that the association's proposed contract was in reality an indemnity agreement and that it did not conform to the Oregon laws. The application for an Oregon license was protested by the American Automobile Association and by various insurance agencies in Oregon, and a hearing was held.

OREGON GRANGERS CONVENTION HERE IN 1931 IS PLAN

Definite plans for presenting an invitation to Granges of Oregon to make Medford the meeting place of the 1931 convention were completed at a meeting held last night in the office of County Agent R. G. Fowler. The formal invitation will be read at the 1930 convention, which opens in Redmond next Monday.

Representatives of seven Granges of southern Oregon attended last night's meeting. Badges, buttons and other advertising material, which will be used in the effort to obtain next year's convention were distributed. Mr. Fowler and a large delegation of Grangers from the Rogue River valley will attend the Redmond meeting and keep the interest in the Medford convention on the increase. Among Grange heads who will attend are: Albert Strauss, master of the Pomona Grange, who called the meeting last night, and R. E. Nealon, master of the Sams Valley Grange, and organizer for the southern district.

Letters have already been sent out by the Pomona Grange and the Medford Chamber of Commerce to all Granges of the state asking them to meet in Medford in June, 1931.

BUTTER FIRMER WITHOUT CHANGE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Butter prices displayed a considerably firmer undertone today, but no changes were announced in quotations. Supplies were less than previously and demand for storage appeared brisker. Premiums were reported paid by some for 92 score product.

Because of low prices, there has been a good demand for eggs, but not sufficient to absorb all the supplies. Prices continue irregular.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, June 5.—(AP)—Professional traders continued their experimental efforts to send prices one way or the other in today's stock market and found speculation for the decline the more effective. Bear selling was in substantial volume for a time, and losses of two points or more were common among the pivotal shares.

Goodyear cut its tire prices about 5 per cent, emphasizing the downward movement of commodity prices, and General Electric declared only the regular dividend, falling to order an extra as was done at this time in each of the three preceding years.

The close was weak. Sales approximated 2,500,000 shares.

WASHINGTON CO. AGENT EXTENSION SPECIALIST

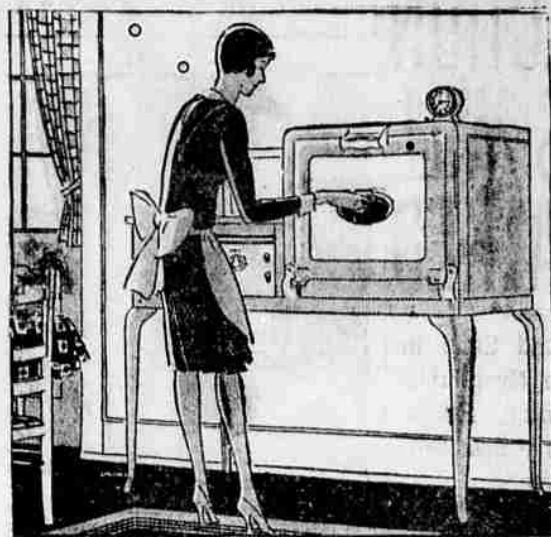

SALEM, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—R. F. Larson, Silverton undertaker, has filed mandamus proceedings in circuit court here against the state embalming board, demanding that a license be granted him.
