Senator Walsh called it "an open case of contempt."

Henry Ford, going to visit Cyrus H. K. Curtis, arrives just in time to read an editorial published by Mr. Curtis that will surprise Mr. Ford.

It says: "Prohibition reform is going over." And "Nothing can stop the growing intent of the people of the United States to preserve the good of the experiment, noble in motive, but to end its unexpected and unnecessary evils."

Henry Ford has said that if prohibition went and beer came back he, Mr. Ford, would close his factories, because men with beer can't work fast enough to keep pace with modern machinery.

Cyrus H. K. Curtis also owns modern, rapid machinery. He and Mr. Ford might have an interesting discussion if they could get their minds off advertising.

FRUIT MEN SEEK MERRIAM'S SCALP

ASSERTION UNFOUNDED UPON FACT

Marion Fruit Men Say Purported Pest Discovery Used to Bolster Argument for Firing of Inspector—A. P. Faithful.

SALEM, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Fruit growers and shippers of this section of the state will demand that acting Governor Hamilton demand of H. S. Merriam, member of the state board of horticulture, his resignation or a complete retraction of his statement here on Wednesday that a "mysterious disease" heretofore known to exist only in Europe has been discovered in an Oregon orchard, it was indicated here Friday.

Confirmation of the reported movement was made by Max Gehlar, a leader in cherry growing circles, who said that he was aware of the agitation, and O. E. Brooks, who said that he was "fully in sympathy with such action."

Merriam's assertions, made at a hearing before the Marion county court on charges he had brought against S. H. Van Trump in seeking Van Trump's removal as county fruit inspector, are entirely unfounded in fact and his reported discovery of such a pest by state and federal inspectors is denied by experts at the state agricultural college and by C. H. Cole, secretary of the state board of horticulture, according to local fruit men who sought to check on Merriam's statements.

VERNAL, Utah, June 6.—(AP)—A Ute Indian keeps his word, even when it pertains to serving a jail sentence. Lester Chappoose, 25, a Ute Indian, was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail several weeks ago for possession of liquor during a bear dance at White Rocks, Utah. He pleaded guilty in federal court. Following pronouncement of the sentence by Federal Judge Tillman D. Johnson, the Indian sought out the magistrate and said: "I am a man of honor and my word is good. My wife is about to become a mother and I am needed at home. Could not your honor allow me to serve my term after our baby is born?"

Bathing Rules Are Issued By Catholic Group

ROME, June 6.—(AP)—The Catholic society, Azione Cattolica, has issued a list of rules for guidance of young men and women regarding bathing and bathing costumes. The regulations state that women's bathing costumes should not be cut like men's, that the costumes for both sexes should cover the person, that women's and men's dressing cabins should be separated, that there should be no dancing in bathing suits, and that there should be police at the bathing beaches.

PANTAGES LIBERATION IS ORDERED

Supreme Court Grants Release of Millionaire Showman On \$100,000 Bond, Pending Action On Appeal From Sentence.

LOS ANGELES, June 6.—(AP)—The California supreme court today ordered the release on bail of Alexander Pantages, millionaire showman who is in the county jail awaiting action on an appeal from his one to fifty year prison sentence for criminal assault. The order, handed down in a brief ruling provided for the 54-year old theater man's release under bond of \$100,000 which must be approved first by the presiding judge of the superior court. Pantages had appealed to the high court from superior court rulings against his release, which he had sought on the contention that jail confinement was endangering his life. He has been confined to the county jail hospital for several months as the result of recurrent heart attacks.

SECRET NOTES ON NAVY PACT ARE WITHHELD

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—Secretary Stimson today refused to turn over to the senate foreign relations committee part of the "informal and confidential" notes exchanged between Great Britain and this government prior to the London naval conference. In a letter to Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee, Secretary Stimson said the notes asked for by Senator Johnson, Republican of California, would be withheld upon the direction of President Hoover.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—The census supervisors of Oregon have completed the count on only ten of the 36 counties in Oregon, although two other counties are listed as incomplete. The twelve indicate an increase in population of 86,792 over 1920. The population of Oregon in 1920 was 783,389.

KVEP OWNER IN SCHERER, RETER COURT APPEAL ATTEND CONFAB AGAINST ORDER ON FRUIT RATE

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 6.—(AP)—Counsel for the radio commission today prepared to resist in the court of appeal of the District of Columbia a petition filed late yesterday by William H. Schaeffer, owner of station KVEP, Portland, Ore., for an order permitting the station to resume operations. Schaeffer also filed notice of appeal from the commission's decision refusing to renew his license which expired May 30. KVEP was ordered off the air for allowing "shockingly vulgar broadcasts" by Robert Gordon Duncan, self-styled Oregon "Wildcat" and defeated candidate for the Republican nomination for congress.

FURNISHING GINGER ALE NOT CRIME

Silver Slipper Cafe Manager in San Francisco Acquitted—Prohi Agents Brought in Own Liquor to Secure Evidence.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—(AP)—The first of the government's test cases against San Francisco restaurant owners who supply patrons with "setups" for the mixing of alcoholic drinks has resulted in the acquittal of Edward Spohn, manager of the Silver Slipper cafe, on a charge of violating the prohibition law.

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NO CHANGE FOR FRUIT INSPECTION

Allen Informs Traffic Assn. Present Policy to Continue—No Drastic, Automatic Or Arbitrary Rulings Are Intended.

There will be no changes in inspection rules for fruit and fruit shipments of this valley, the Rogue River Valley Traffic association was informed today noon at a special meeting by A. C. Allen, horticultural commissioner for southern Oregon, and Fletcher Fish, inspector in charge.

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
