COMMENCEMENT TONIGHT CLIMAX IN SCHOOL YEAR

The public schools formally closed for the year this afternoon, but the spectacular event of the closing will be the commencement exercises in the Armory tonight, beginning at 8 o'clock, when 131 girls and boys of the senior class will receive their diplomas.

The pupils of the grade schools who had not attended school yesterday at this forenoon, reported at their various rooms at 2 o'clock this afternoon to receive their grade cards. There were very few, if any, farewell festivities today as the grade pupils had been having parties, parties, etc., during the week.

The high school pupils received their grade cards this morning at the senior high school, and were being re-registered during the remainder of the day.

Students are also being registered for the summer school, which will be conducted at the Junior high building for six weeks.

No reports as to how many will attend have been received at the school headquarters, office.

B. F. Irvine, editor of the Portland Journal, who is to deliver the Commencement address tonight, will arrive on the southbound Shasta at 7:10 p. m.

Eleven hundred seats are being reserved on the main floor of the Armory for the relatives and friends of the graduates and members of the faculty.

CANNING CENTER MENACED BY FIRE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 6.—(AP)—Fire which for more than three hours threatened to engulf the entire business district of Ileton, an important canning center of 3500 population of the Sacramento River valley, was reported under control at 3 a. m. after damage tentatively estimated at over \$100,000 had been caused and two dwellings.

LINCOLN STAGES BARRED IN STATE

SALEM, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—The public service commission today cancelled the operating permit of the Lincoln stages of Oregon, Inc. The lines have been operating between Oregon and California. Recently it ceased operation for 24 hours without notifying the commission, which is against the law. This was extended to five days which gives the commission legal authority to cancel the permit after hearing. Yesterday was set as the time for hearing, but the company did not appear.

INJURED WOMAN DIES IN HILT HOSPITAL

Without regaining consciousness since falling off the southbound Shasta train last Saturday night, Mrs. F. E. Garrison, 55, died yesterday afternoon at the Hill, Cal., hospital. No explanation has been found how or why she left the train. She was found alongside the railroad tracks, 11 hours after she had fallen and suffered from exposure. Her home is believed to be at Salem and she is thought to have relatives at Sacramento.
