MINIATURE GOLF COURSE TO OPEN ON OAKDALE AVE.

A miniature golf course for Medford is in the last stages of completion at Oakdale and Eighth streets and will be ready for play next week, open daily from 10 a. m. to midnight. It consists of 18 holes, composition greens, bank shots, bunkers, water hazards and other features.

This game has taken the country by storm and originated less than nine months ago in the east and is now introduced in practically every large city of the United States. The entire course is played with standard putter and regulation golf balls. Admission price will be held to 30 cents for adults and 15 cents for children. A professional instructor will be at the course every night and will give free instruction. The clubs, score cards and balls will be furnished by the operator. All low scores will be placed on file for future reference.

All materials used in the construction of the course were supplied by local business houses.
