

JAMES COX FOR REPEAL OF DRY LAW

Ohio Democrats Told of Preference for Federal Control — Ex-Senator Pomerene Joins in Stand — Saloon Not Wanted.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 6.—(AP)—Repeal of the eighteenth amendment is "unhesitatingly favored" by former James M. Cox of Ohio, the Democratic presidential nominee in 1920.

Cox injected the prohibition issue into this party's campaign at a "victory dinner" of Ohio Democrats here last night at which he acted as toastmaster. He announced preference for government control of manufacture and distribution of liquor.

The former governor was joined in his stand against prohibition by former United States Senator Atlee Pomerene of Cleveland, but the party's attitude on the question was left unsettled when the final speaker, former Congressman Martin L. Davey of Kent, candidate for governor in 1928, urged that the issue be left alone.

Saloon Not Wanted

"The people will never change the existing order by bringing back the saloons," Cox said, "nor will private interests ever again be permitted to become selfishly allied on any side of the issue."

"With this understanding, I unhesitatingly favor the repeal of the 18th amendment. As between the old saloon order, with its brewery-controlled politics and what not, and the set up, I would prefer the latter, but we all prefer not being compelled to choose between the two extremes. Both are impossible."

Cox said there is need of another government provision "which shall in plain terms prohibit the manufacture or traffic in alcoholic liquors in America by private or corporate interests."

Forecast Victory

The former presidential nominee and former three-term governor of Ohio made his announcement before introducing the guest of honor, J. J. Shouse, chairman of the national Democratic executive committee. Shouse arranged the present national administration and forecast a Democratic victory in the fall.

"We know the people are tired of the record of poor judgment, indecision, feebleness and inefficiency that has characterized the present administration," Shouse said. "Cox set at rest various rumors that he would be a candidate for governor or senator. He declared that he would seek election to no office."

Statement Played

STEAMER LINE VIA PORTLAND TO SELL STOCK

Rose City Firms Take Major Portion of Issue—Ships Will Ply Between Coasts and Orient.

SALEM, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—The Pacific-Atlantic Navigation company, which is to build five ships to operate between Atlantic ports and the Orient by way of Portland and other Pacific coast ports, and which will be the first company of its kind to make the port of Portland its home port, today received from the state corporation department a permit to sell \$5,000,000 worth of stock. Thirty-three Portland firms and individuals already have subscribed to \$2,104,000 of the stock.

A report made to the corporation commissioner says that the company proposes to build immediately five combination passenger and cargo steamers to operate between Atlantic ports and Manila, by way of Havana, the Panama Canal, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland and Japanese and Chinese ports. The construction of the ships, it is stated, will require about 20 months.

TACOMA JANITOR HEIR TO FORTUNE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Louis Zwanek, Tacoma janitor, was on the high seas bound for Germany today to claim an estate reported valued at \$100,000, but a woman, who claimed to be his wife was in Portland living with her daughter, a Grant high school student. The woman called a newspaper here last night by telephone and said Zwanek deserted her four years ago.

An Associated Press report from Tacoma yesterday said that when Zwanek sailed he took with him his daughter, Gertrude, 18. The Portland woman said she would like to know who the "daughter" was.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—The senate today passed and sent to the house today a bill by Senator McNary, Republican of Oregon, requiring the packers of canned food products to label to show if the product falls below standards fixed by the department of agriculture.

OREGON CORPORATIONS PAYING ANNUAL FEES

SALEM, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Annual payments of corporation fees from Oregon concerns are now being received by the state corporation department. The due date is July 1. During May about \$33,000 in fees was received and this month it is estimated that the payments will reach \$50,000 or \$50,000. Some payments, it was said, will be delayed until as late as September.
