

FARM HAND AND VICTIM DISCOVERED

Thirteen-Year-Old Daughter of Employer Shot By Crazy Man Who Then Suicides — Mother Had Confidence in Man.

ROCHESTER, Mich., June 6.—A coroner's inquest today was expected to write an official "final" to the insane drama in which, police say, Henry Clouse, 46, farm hand, was driven by hopeless affection and disordered mind to kill Marjorie Clemons, 13-year-old daughter of his landlord and then take his own life. Bodies of the man and girl were found late yesterday huddled side by side beneath a blanket at the edge of a woodland clearing on an abandoned farm seven miles north of here. The girl had been shot in the back of the head. Clouse was shot twice through the mouth. His thumb still was on the trigger of a rifle which he had borrowed from Marjorie's father a week ago. They had been dead for several days.

Car Burned.

Clouse's automobile in which they drove away Saturday night from the Clemons home, where Clouse roomed for 11 years, was found nearby, a charred wreck. A bottle which Clouse had filled with kerosene in a Rochester garage shortly before he set out, presumably to instruct Marjorie in driving after dark, was standing a short distance away, evidence that he had deliberately planned the crime and had prepared to burn the car. Police said the girl's body was bruised as if she might have been subjected to an attack.

Since Sunday when the alarm was first spread for the missing couple, Mrs. A. E. Clemons, the mother, had expressed entire confidence in Clouse, who had come to be regarded almost as a member of the family through his long residence in the household.

It was professional baseball that gave Hamilton a foothold on the Pacific coast. As pitcher for the University of Missouri team he was known in intercollegiate athletic circles as a speed demon with a number of no-hit games on his record. After graduation Hamilton received offers from the Kansas City American association club and from the St. Louis Americans. Friends urged him to accept. Hamilton thought it over and decided against it. He had a law diploma and wanted to use it, so he went to Oklahoma and got a job as a law clerk, and another side job as night clerk in a hotel.
