James E. Conder officiating. Interment in the Medford cemetery.

### Medford Post, American Legion, will have charge of the services at the grave.

Ive was born at Harriman, Tennessee, April 15th, 1895, and was aged 35 years, one month and 16 days. He came to Medford with his parents in 1918. He had been flying for the past 12 years, and will be remembered by his friends as a visitor here in Medford a number of years ago.

Some of the club members will leave Medford by auto with R. G. Fowler, county agent, who will go on from Corvallis to Redmond to attend the convention of Oregon granges.

In the group of club members named the following won scholarships to the summer session as first prizes at the state fair: Dorothy Smith, Dorothy Jones, Janice Hessegrave, Delmer Smith and James Martin.

Each year during the month of June a two weeks summer school of 4-H club members is conducted at Oregon State college. It is the outstanding activity of the year for the club and enables members from all sections of the state to gather for additional instruction in subjects relating to their club projects. The school is organized for instruction in agriculture and home economics besides affording opportunity for recreation and organized play.

All club members who were awarded scholarships at the 1929 state fair or at county and community fairs are eligible for entrance. Also a club member 12 years of age or over whose 1929 club work is up to date and who is elected as a delegate or is paying his or her own expenses.
