

JACKSON COUNTY MAN STRIKES IT RICH IN ALASKA

The following interesting article concerning T. J. Devenney, brother of Mrs. Calley Stendman of Phoenix and scion of a well known pioneer Jackson county family, appeared in an Alaskan newspaper:

VALDEZ, Alaska.—Three hundred feet below the surface, 16 inches of solid quartz carrying values in free gold, so high that a nugget of any size, in any portion up would not be an exaggeration—ore so rich that no assay is necessary to demonstrate that there is a fortune in sight—are in which the glittering yellow metal is everywhere apparent in size from flakes to veritable nuggets. This was the news brought to town by T. J. Devenney when he returned from the property near Mineral Creek, owned by him and W. A. Dolan, and on which they have been doing development work for more than two years. He brought with him a sack of ore that bears out all his assertions.

A small shot has dissipated all fears as to whether or not the ore goes down in the mine or whether the values are maintained, said Mr. Devenney, for there is the vein, in the lowest tunnel, wider and richer than on the surface. "There is no longer any question but that we have a mine," said Devenney, "and in that mine a stake will provide us with all that we require for the remainder of our lives—a mine that will give a big boost to the Valdez mining district."

The Devenney-Dolan claims are situated a short distance below the mouth of Mineral creek, on the north side of Valdez Bay, and are not over five miles from the town of Valdez. They are ideally located in that they are but a short distance from the shore, affording economical transportation of machinery and supplies.

Mr. Devenney will leave shortly for the property and will continue driving in on the pay sheet to ascertain its extent, and as soon as this has been determined, plans will be made to install a mill on the property.

Mr. Devenney's success in his latest mining venture has been received with pleasure by his relatives and many friends in the Rogue River valley.
