MEDFORD TENNIS TEAMS TO PLAY KLAMATH STARS

Featured by the playing for the first time in recent years of a full ladies' tennis team, a return match between the Klamath and Medford Tennis clubs will be played Sunday on the courts of the former in Moore park on Lake Klamath. WYKOFF STEPS CENTURY DASH FOR NEW MARK

CHICAGO, June 7.—(AP)—Move over, Gallant Fox, and make room for Frank Wykoff, another champion, smiling 20-year-old youngster of the University of Southern California.

Traveling faster than any human being has run 100 yards before, Wykoff eclipsed the world record for the century to thrill a crowd of 12,000 today when he won the event in the national collegiate track and field championships on Staggfield in 9.4.

Wykoff established his remarkable record without the use of starting blocks, wiping out the existing mark of 9.5 by Eddie Tolan, the University of Michigan's great negro sprinter. The youth from the coast with his boyish face and wavy blond hair, not only eclipsed the record but also defeated George Simpson, the Buckeye bullet from Ohio State university, who a year ago raced to victory in 9.4, but whose world record performance was rejected by the International Amateur Athletic Federation because he made it with starting blocks.

Wykoff's sensational victory was instrumental in helping Southern California carry off the team championship, making the Trojans track and field champions of the nation. The much-touted mile run failed to bring out anything more than a spirited race which was won by Sivaik Butler college, in the rather slow time of 4:19.2.

Kiser, Washington, finished second by three yards, with Makeover of Illinois, third, HBL, Oregon, was sixth. Kiser attempted to set a pace all the way but failed on the last lap when Swartz of Western State Teachers, Kalamazoo, challenged and dropped back. Swartz, in his turn, gave way to Sivaik in the stretch and the Hoosier was adding to his margin as he broke the tape.

NO GOLDEN FLOOD FOR SHARKEY BOUT WITH TEUTON FOE

NEW YORK, June 7.—(AP)—The money changers in the box office windows of Madison Square Garden shuffled stacks of bills and change briskly today as the financial features of next Thursday's championship fight came in for a brief bit of attention. In the camps of Max Schmeling and Jack Sharkey leather flew furiously and the gladiators headed into the training home stretch.

A complete set of figures covering all the financial possibilities of the 15-round contest was blazoned at the garden and for the first time since the opening of the ticket sale it was indicated on the basis of receipts that the net gains, exclusive of taxes, should run somewhat over \$300,000. Cash in the bank and gift-order orders amounted today to less than \$400,000.

The garden prediction that the gate would total \$700,000, cast aside permanently previous generous forecasts of the first million dollar affair since Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney rolled up their record breaking \$3,000,000 total in Chicago in 1927. The garden also revealed that if every one of the \$1,531 tickets issued for the match was sold by Thursday night the total receipts would amount to a net of only \$302,591. Thousands of these benches, however, will be filled by complimentary ticket holders.

HARD LUCK NAGS CARDINAL HOPES

ST. LOUIS, June 7.—(AP)—If it isn't one thing, it's another. So says Manager Charles "Gabby" Street, after his St. Louis Cardinals had dropped ten of the last eleven games after a winning streak of 17 out of 18.

The grief started after Street and his men left here for a road trip May 24, resting in first place in the league standing. After two victories injuries started taking a toll.

Charley Gelbert, who had been playing sensationally at short, and batting .340, developed a "Charley Horse" at Chicago. Next Frankie Frisch, who had made a great combination with Gelbert in the infield, was spiked in Philadelphia. Then Jess Haines, pitcher, was injured when hit on the leg by a line drive.

The next regular to be lost was Ernie Osratt, whose ankle, broken earlier in the season, weakened, and Jim Bottomley's injured thumb and Chick Hafey's weak eyes have handicapped their hitting. With Gelbert, Frisch, Osratt and Hafey ailing, the Cards have lost their batting punch.

Then Street's hurling staff went bad, all of the pitchers being wild. Only one pitcher has finished a game started in the last 11 and even then 2 times lost to Chicago, 6 to 5.

In the meantime Street has been hard-pressed to supply capable substitutes and his team has dropped out of the first division.
