

Claim Gall Stones Chemical Fault

Liver Operating Below Normal,
From Limited Nerve
Flow

The Liver

The liver is the largest gland of the body and is situated in the upper and right portion of the abdomen. Its principal function or work is to secrete or form bile, a fluid which is used in the intestinal digestion. The gall bladder is the reservoir for the bile. It is a conical, pear-shaped sac, lodged in the depression on the under surface of the right lobe of the liver and connected to it by the connective tissue.

How Gall Stones Are Formed

The liver is more or less continually at work secreting this bile, which, when it is not used for digestive purposes, is stored away by the reservoir (the gall bladder), and very rarely is the gall bladder found to be empty. The bile, like all other fluids of the body, contains a small per cent of mineral matter. In case there should be a chronic inflammation or excessive heat in the gall bladder, it will produce a crystallization of the mineral element of the bile, so that it takes the form of small, solid, hard particles, the same as the mineral cake forms in the bottom of the tea kettle that has been used for a long time. These crystallized mineral particles collect in the gall bladder and adhere to particles of bile pigment (coloring matter). By the movements of the gall bladder these particles are rolled around within it, thus collecting other particles which in time form a calculus, or stone. Stones formed in this way and in this place are called gall stones.

Why Are Gall Stones Pains Not Constant?

Gall stones may remain in the gall bladder for an indefinite time and yet give rise to no symptoms indicating their presence. But should they leave the gall bladder, passing through the bile ducts, intense pain called hepatic colic, is produced. An attack of hepatic colic begins suddenly with intense cutting pains in the right side just below the ribs and often radiates along the ribs upward toward the right shoulder, because this is the path of the nerves leading from the spine to the liver. There may and may not be a chill and fever of 101 to 103 degrees. During the attack the liver becomes swollen, tender, easily felt, and there may be vomiting and drenching sweat. In about one-half of all the cases, jaundice or yellowness of the skin appears. The duration of the attack is variable, lasting from a few hours to several days with recurrences and exacerbations until the stone is finally expelled into the small intestine, from which it passes. This colic or pain is produced by the hard, sharp stone scratching or tearing the delicate mucous membrane lining of the bile ducts.

Now some may say that an operation is the only means of getting these stones out, in view of the fact that they are already formed and in the gall bladder. But should they be removed by operating, what is going to hinder more from being formed? Evidently there must be a cause for their formation. It has already been stated that they are formed by excessive heat crystallizing mineral elements in the bile. Can heat be cut out with a knife? What folly! The next question that naturally arises is what causes the excessive heat? Heat is produced in any organ by the activity of that organ. If the organ is extremely active, it forms large amounts of heat, just as the body does when we exercise freely. This heat production is controlled through the nerve fibers which supply the organ, and in the case of the gall bladder it is excessive only when the nerve fibers cannot properly function. There is only one place where their function can be interfered with and that is when they leave the spine. If the small bones of the spine are out of their normal positions, they press upon the nerves and cause them to function abnormally. It is the business of the chiropractor to locate this trouble in the spine and correct it.
