## EVIDENCE LACKING TO CONVICT YOUNG BURGLAR SUSPECT

Ernest Eller, charged with participation in the robbery of the Brown Mercantile company store at Eagle Point, in the early morning of March 7th last, was acquitted yesterday, when the court ordered a directed verdict of acquittal. The state failed to make a case.

Eller with three other members of a gang who turned state's evidence was alleged to have participated in the robbery. The defendant "got a break" in a law, that dates back 200 years, and is a part of the Oregon statutes. It provides against conviction upon the uncorroborated evidence of an accomplice in a crime.

Eller also offered an alibi. He showed by witnesses that he had spent a large portion of the late evening of the date of the crime, talking to the clerk in the Grand Hotel, and had gone to bed about two o'clock, complaining of a toothache.

The state failed to show that Eller knew the other members of the gang, and offered no witnesses to show that ever had been in their company.

Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, after clearing away routine matters here leaves this afternoon for Grants Pass, where he will hold court the balance of the week.

## COVER SPRAY FOR CODLING MOTH IS ADVICE OF AGENT

Apples.  
The prolonged cold weather has divided the first brood codling moth flight in such a manner that it is advisable to apply a third cover spray. This spray should be completed by June 17th.

If the oil-lead arsenate combination was used in the last cover spray, it is advisable to use lead arsenate only, at the rate of three pounds per hundred gallons of water. If this combination was not used in the last spray, added control may be obtained by using one gallon of a light type summer oil emulsion, plus one-half pound casein spreader, plus two pounds of lead arsenate per hundred gallons of water.

Pears.  
It is considered good insurance to apply a third cover spray on all varieties of pears, for reasons stated above.

This should be completed by June 17th. Use three pounds of arsenate of lead to 100 gallons of water.

Spider mites have not yet been found on pear trees in sufficient numbers to warrant the addition of oil at this time. Any grower who suspects an infestation should get in touch with the county agent.

And though the songs are an integral part of the poignant drama, the story itself is a great motion picture play, aside from the music.

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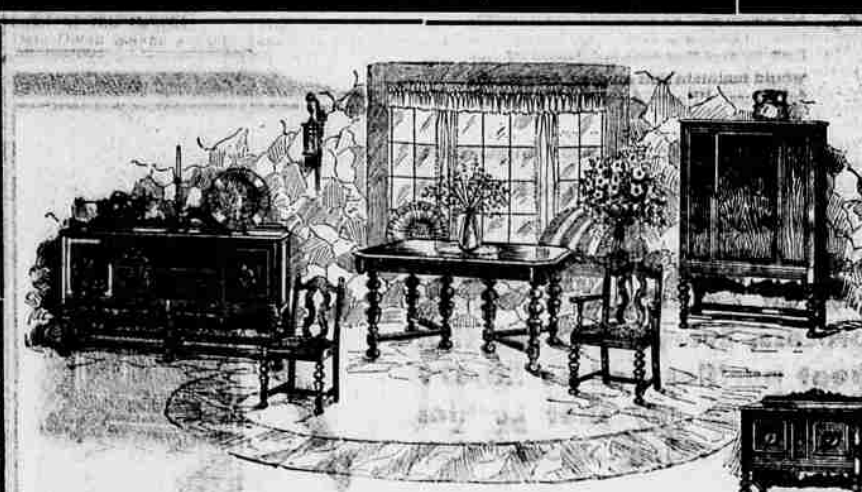
