

MEDFORD YOUTH CONTINUES REST IN COUNTY JAIL

Ray (Red) Vinson, local young man, who it is claimed by the police has long had such an aversion for work of any kind that he will not even try to get a job and who the officers also say they have long suspected of bootlegging in the city will for the next 60 days reside in the county jail, as Judge Taylor in the city court yesterday afternoon sentenced him to that institution on a charge of vagrancy.

Vinson was originally arrested on a charge of selling a pint of booze in a local pool hall, was arraigned yesterday morning in court, and his case was continued until afternoon, at which time the arresting officers charged the charge to one of vagrancy, on which he was found guilty.

BUTTER AND EGGS TURN EASIER WITH WARMER WEATHER

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—(AP) The underdone of the butter market appeared easier today although there was no change in price. Receipts have been liberal and demand light.

Egg quotations looked weak, without announcement of official change. In some quarters it was reported that warm weather has begun to affect quality.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says: "Vegetable shippers are competing actively for green peas, and outside demand, from Puget Sound points and the east, far exceeds the present supply."

"Supplies of Oregon celery are increasing, and prices are lower, ranging from \$1.25 to \$1.75. "Washington is shipping cherries in considerably greater volume than Oregon thus far.

"Cantaloupes and tomatoes are still in heavy supply; the demand is moderate, but not sufficient to assimilate the offerings."

Westinghouse Electric, after dropping more than \$11, reduced its loss to \$7.25. J. I. Case closed at \$216.50, off \$20.50.

Although trading was in reduced volume early it swelled rapidly in the last hour, and the day's total transactions exceeded 4,400,000 shares.
