

DRAIN STUDIES WILL CONTINUE WITH U. S. AID

Demonstrations Yesterday Well Attended By Valley Farmers—\$5000 Available for Work.

Drainage demonstration held yesterday at the Williamson tract on Beall Lane, and at the Paul Scherer orchard near Tolo, were attended by five times as many farmers and orchardists as attended the first one, held a month ago, fifty were at the morning meeting, and sixty-five at the afternoon session.

After June 30, the drainage and irrigation work of the valley will be conducted, with federal funds, \$5000 is available from an appropriation by congress. The amount was originally \$10,000, but was swatted by the economy ax. It is thought that sufficient funds will be available for a thorough conduct of the work.

No definite program has been mapped out for the 1930-31 study, but it will include the extension of the present research, and enlargement of its scope.

Irrigation, in all its phases, will be studied, and from time to time orchardists and landowners will be advised as to the uses and abuses, if any, of irrigation waters in these parts. The irrigation ditches will also be probed to determine their weaknesses, if any.

Last spring, as an educational pointer, water users were requested to keep ditches free of material apt to result in seepage, and the advice has been followed to a large extent.

Before the new program is definitely determined, there will be a meeting of federal irrigation officials, Oregon state irrigation experts, and valley landowners and irrigation districts.

BERRY SEASON IN NORTHWEST COUNTIES PAST

Crop Condition Summary Shows Generally Favorable Conditions in Oregon—Farm Work Ahead.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—(AP)—The United States department of agriculture, weather bureau, issued its weekly summary of weather and crop conditions today, as follows:

Some rain fell in northwestern counties early in the week, and later there were a few widely scattered thundershowers, but there was little interference with farm work on account of rain.

Cereals: Winter wheat is mostly headed and in the milder sections is filling. Except in some central counties where moisture is scarce, it is making good advance. The warmer weather has resulted in improvement of corn and some fields in the south are being cultivated.

Fruits: The height of the strawberry season is past in northwestern counties. Can fruits are doing well but show much winter injury. Thinning of apples and pears is in progress. Cherries are ripening in small quantities.

Meadows, Pastures and Ranges: Cutting of alfalfa and clover made better progress, due to warmer weather. The second crop is making a good start in southern counties.

Livestock: Warmer weather was favorable for sheep-shearing, which is nearly or quite finished in many places. Stock is doing well in all sections. Conditions have been favorable for turkeys.

Miscellaneous: The stand of melons has been reduced by cold weather, but conditions during the week were favorable for melons and gardeners.

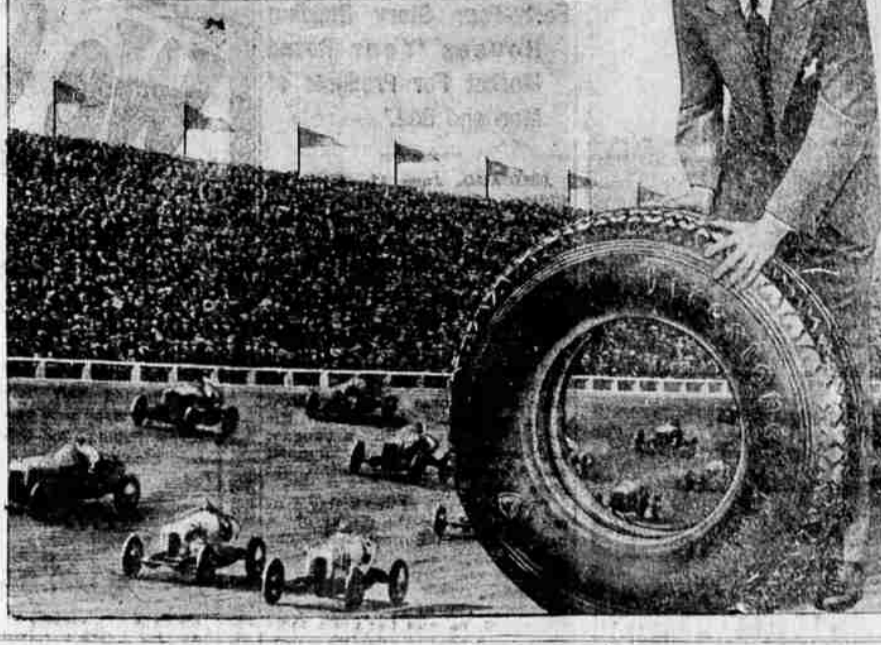

LEPER COLONY NEGLECTED IS MEDICS CHARGE

Oregon Man Resigns Post On Molokai Island When Plans for Betterment Are Rebuffed.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—(AP)—Dr. Robert Lindsay McArthur, Portland, who returned home today after resigning his position as territorial government physician in the leper settlement at Kalaupapa at Molokai island, charged that deplorable physical and moral conditions are permitted to exist while the territorial board of health has refused to consider a constructive program.

Dr. McArthur, who was graduated with the University of Oregon class of 1920 and from the medical school in 1926, said in his letter of resignation, which contained the charges, caused the greatest sensation in Honolulu in recent years. The letter was dated to become effective yesterday.

The Oregon medic said that dur-

ing his three-year term at the leper haven, he was constantly rebuffed by the territorial board of health on every major project he undertook for the betterment of the colony.
