All Incumbents Returned to Office in Federation Vote, With Exception of the Treasurer.

DENVER, June 12.—(AP)—Mrs. John F. Sippel of Baltimore, was announced to be re-elected president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs at the convention here today.

Mrs. Sippel and the entire slate of incumbent officers, with the single exception of treasurer, were returned to office.

Others re-elected were Mrs. Grace Morrison Poole, Brockton, Mass., first vice president; Mrs. Eugene B. Lawson, Tulsa, Okla., second vice president and Mrs. Henry C. Taylor, Bloomfield, Ind., secretary. Succeeding Mrs. H. G. Reynolds of Paducah, Ky., Mrs. Edward Hammett of Saeboyan, Wis., was elected treasurer.

Tentative opposition to Mrs. Sippel, which expressed itself in favor of Mrs. Edward Franklin White of Indianapolis to head the organization, resulted in 35 votes for the Indianapolis club woman out of a total of 665 cast.

Mrs. Poole and Mrs. Emily Plumley of Glenbrook, Minn., each were given courtesy votes for the presidency.

ESPEE ANNOUNCES SCHEDULE CHANGE

Changes in the schedule of trains leaving Medford to become effective Sunday, June 15th, were announced today by the Southern Pacific. The Oregonian northbound will leave at 6:20 p. m. instead of 6:25, the Shasta northbound at 10:40 a. m. instead of 11:30 a. m. as at present, and the Shasta southbound will leave at 7 p. m. instead of 7:10. The southbound Oregonian, No. 13, will leave at 11:40 in accordance with the present schedule.
