OPEN PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL WITH CEREMONY

Queen Caroline Crowned in Morning Fete—City in Gala Attire for Annual Event.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—Yesterday she was Caroline Hahn, 17-year-old Portland high

line this morning marked the opening of Portland's annual rose festival. The city has spent many days dressing itself for the event, which has attracted visitors from virtually every part of the country. Lawns, shrubs, and gardens have been trimmed and the rose bushes throughout the city are heavy with flowers.

The finest roses from the gardens of amateur and professional growers are on exhibition today. An unusual feature of the festival program brought together 10,000 Portland school children in a huge exhibition of drills and dances at the Multnomah stadium. The climax of the festival will come tomorrow night with an air circus, the Joral parade, and mardi gras night. The Friday evening celebration will be described over the National Broadcasting company's network.

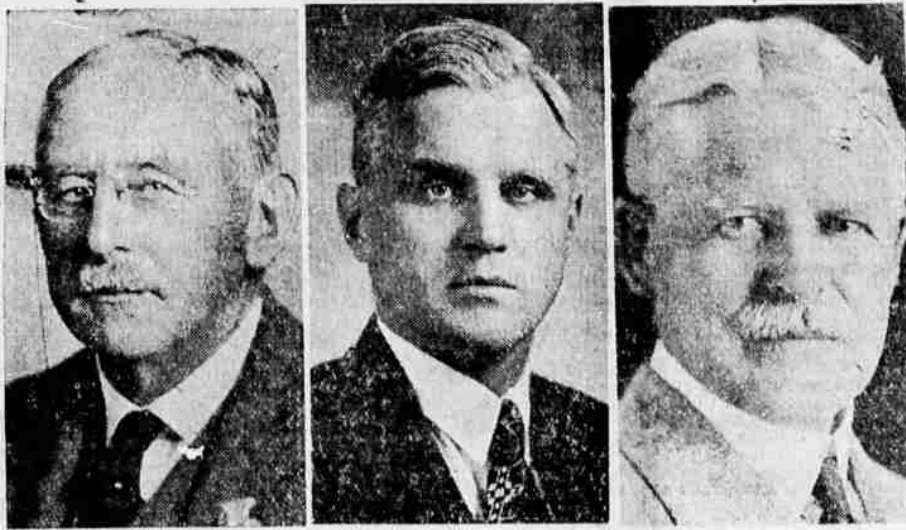
Although Queen Caroline's rule will terminate with the stroke of 12 Friday night, the rose exhibit and hospitality day will continue through Saturday and Sunday.

ROSE CITY TRAIN MEN GIVEN RAISE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—The board of arbitration which heard the wage dispute between the Portland Electric Power company and employes of the street railway system, today announced wage increases ranging from \$4 to \$8 a month would be awarded. Platform men, the board announced, will receive increases ranging from \$5 to \$8 and shop and track men will receive \$4 monthly. The new scale is retroactive to March 6, 1929, and active until April 30, 1931.

C., a leading authority on wood utilization.

Dr. Andrew Ellicott Douglass, right, director of Steward Observatory, University of Arizona, eminent astronomer, will describe his experiences as leader of the National Geographic Society tree ring expedition, conducted last year through the Southwest of the United States.

The court found that Mrs. Pickard had seen the car approaching and did not warn her husband.

SASKATCHEWAN WOODS AFLAME AFTER DROUGHT

Sixty Million Feet of Valuable Timber Taken—Other Stands Menaced—Fighters Fall Back.

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., June 12.—(AP)—Defeated in their efforts to save 60,000,000 feet of valuable timber in the 20 square mile reserve of the Pas Lumber company at Birch lake, sixty miles east of here, forestry officials today ordered their fire fighters into the north where flames are menacing other valuable stands. A force of 200 men who had been combating five fires in the Birch lake district of the Churchill river where two outbreaks threatened the destruction of valuable pulpwood.
