Accompanied by Francis P. White, assistant secretary of state, and the military and naval aides of the White House, Mr. Prestes was received by Mr. Hoover in the historic blue room.

K. F. PRISONER IS ROBBERY SUSPECT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—William L. Priest, Oregon manager of a national detective agency and Sheriff Mass of Oregon City were en route to Klamath Falls today to question George Franch, alias George R. Stinson, held there in connection with the robbery of the First State bank at Milwaukie, Ore., April 17.

Priest said that Stinson had been under surveillance for some time. Stinson had been employed at a lumber mill here and was arrested by a detective in a rooming house. He denied implication in the robbery but told police he had been implicated in a bank robbery in California.

Boulder Dam's First \$10,000,000 Just Gets Labor, Tools, To Site

By Frank I. Weller, Associated Press Staff Writer. WASHINGTON.—(AP)—The \$10,000,000 initial Boulder dam appropriation President Hoover requested of congress on arrival of signed contracts for power, will be used primarily to get workmen and their equipment into Black canyon.

Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation, says the first of the eight years' work scheduled for the huge concrete wedge will be to build a highway to run to the top of the cliffs overlooking the dam site.

The five other main operations expected to start immediately after the appropriation, include construction of railroads for delivering materials, a townsite for the working force, sanitation, a water system, four diversion tunnels through which the Colorado river will flow during the construction of the dam and installation of power.

Probably the most spectacular engineering feat will be encountered in getting railroad spurs to the dam site. The summit of the plateau is several miles back from the river and can be reached without unusual difficulty by a branch line from the railway running through Las Vegas, Nevada.

But, from the summit down to the canyon, the decline is so sharp it will involve specially constructed tracks and locomotives. Once at the base of the decline one spur will run to the left around the cliffs and down to the river, another to the right and a third sharply down the face of the canyon for 300 feet.

The first two will be used to get materials to both sides of the dam and the third to carry them when the dam starts rising to its 725 feet of height. Getting the railroad to the bottom of the canyon is expected to cost \$2,500,000.

Before anything can be done, four tunnels, 50 by 50 feet and 4,000 feet long, two on each side of the river, must be drilled through the canyon walls to divert the water from the dam site. They will cost \$17,000,000.

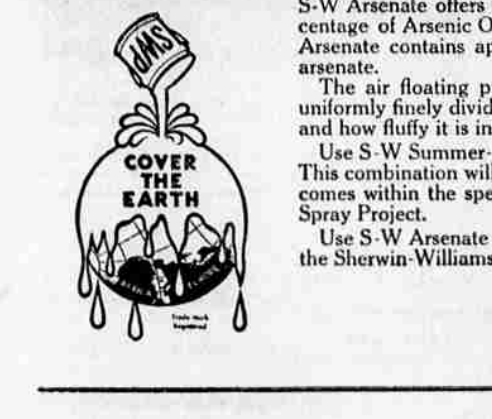
