## SETTLING PONDS CLEAR WATER IN B. F. CONTROVERSY WITH TEACHERS IS ROGUE FOR FISH TOPIC AT HEARING

No more muddy water will be entering the Rogue from the scene of operations of the Rogue River Gold company, Footh Creek, it was announced this morning. Large settling ponds are being constructed by the company to catch the water coming down the creek. Here it will be held until the mud has settled to the bottom and allowed to go on into the river when it has reached its natural clear state.

This construction work is following completion of arrangements made at a recent meeting of representatives of the Frank Walton League of Josephine county and the Jackson County Game Protective association with D. H. Ferry of the Rogue River Gold company.

The building of the ponds has been made possible by owners of the adjoining lands, who have granted the company permission to construct them. The members of the Frank Walton league and the Jackson County Game Protective association were expressing their appreciation of the project through the Rogue River committee today. They have been assured by Mr. Ferry that no more muddy water will enter the Rogue after the ponds are completed as a result of the operation of the gold dredge.
