Seattle Takes Twin Bill From Basement Champs—Sacs in Double Defeat of Oakland.

Seattle and Sacs were the winners in yesterday's eight games closing the tenth week of the first half Pacific Coast league baseball season. The Senators took two games from Oakland, 9 to 3 and 5 to 4, maintaining the firm hold on first place, and the Indians, downing Portland twice, 3 to 9 and 7 to 4, climbed out of the cellar, where they had been for a day.

San Francisco ended the week in second place, clinching its position with Los Angeles by taking the second game yesterday, 10 to 5, after losing the opener, 4 to 6. In the seven-inning nightcap the Seals started their heavy hitting by driving Walsh out in the first, and collected a total of 16 hits, four homers, off Walsh, Yerkes and Babler, Shelly connected for the circuit twice.

Home-runs were plentiful as the Missions took the odd game of their series with Hollywood by winning the morning contest, 15 to 4, although they dropped the afternoon game, 8 to 13. Seattle profited by the three-hit pitching of "Dutch" Reuther, in their first game with Portland, and the Ducks were shut out as Maids yielded three runs. PHILADELPHIA REGAINS LEAD IN AMERICAN

Groves' Pitching for Athletics and Gehrig-Ruth Bombardment of Cleveland Turn Trick.

Thanks to the good left arm of Robert Moses Groves and the powerful bats of Lou Gehrig and Babe Ruth, the Philadelphia Athletics are leading the American league again today.

Groves' invincible pitching yesterday enabled the Athletics to whip Detroit, 10 to 1, while Gehrig and Ruth were battling the Yankees to a 17-10 victory over Cleveland, eastwide pace setters in the circuit. These two results combined to send the Athletics back into first place by a margin of one full game.

Gehrig hit his 16th and 17th and Ruth his 21st home run in the Yankee massacre of Cleveland. The St. Louis Browns nipped the only other National league game by whipping the Chicago Cubs, 7-4. Brooklyn lost ground to the Giants by dropping a 9-4 decision to the St. Louis Cardinals.

In the only other National league game the Boston Braves beat Cincinnati, 4-3, behind steady pitching by Ben Cantwell.
