FISH PETITIONS SUFFICIENT FOR VOTE, IS BELIEF

A sufficient number of names on petitions to insure placement of the Rogue River fishing amendment on the ballot in the November election has apparently been obtained. It was announced this morning at the office of the Rogue River committee. Petitions are being checked in clerks' offices of all counties of the state to see that they are signed by registered voters.

ADVANCE INFORMATION IS THAT ENOUGH PERSONS HAVE ALREADY SIGNED TO GET THE AMENDMENT ON THE BALLOT, ALTHOUGH ALL THE PETITIONS HAVE NOT BEEN RETURNED TO MEDFORD.

THE COMMITTEE ANTICIPATED THAT THE REQUIRED NUMBER OF NAMES WOULD BE SECURED BY JUNE 15. REQUESTS HAVE BEEN SECURED FROM ALL PARTS OF THE STATE ASKING FOR ANOTHER WEEK IN WHICH TO CIRCULATE ADDITIONAL PETITIONS.

The committee believes that there will be several thousand more than the required number of names delivered to the secretary of state with request for placing the amendment on the ballot.
