## FEDERAL OFFICER TAKING THREE TO FACE JURY TRIAL

Deputy United States Marshal Cal C. Wells arrived in the city last night on route with three prisoners from Klamath Falls, where they had been remanded to United States court custody at Portland, and them incarcerated in the county jail for last night and today, and will leave this evening with them for Portland.

His prisoners are Frank Martin, well known Klamath Falls resident and former court house janitor there, who is held to the federal court on a \$2500 bond, on a possession of liquor accusation on the Indian reservation, and Burl Newtown, 23 years old, and Mildred Murphy, 16 years old, both from Oklahoma, who are held on a white slave charge following their recent apprehension in Klamath Falls on charges sworn out by the Muskogee, Okla., authorities.

On arrival at Portland the United States court is expected to at once order their being taken to Muskogee for delivery to the authorities there. Inasmuch as it is Mr. Wells' case, he will no doubt be assigned to take the young couple to Oklahoma if he wants to make the trip, but said today his feelings would not be hurt if one of the other deputy marshals would take over this travel job. If he himself goes it probably will be two weeks before he returns to Medford.
