

DRY AGENT KILLED BY RUM GANG

Gun Fight Follows Attempt to Halt Liquor Runners' Auto—Three Officers Injured—Agent's Auto Is Wrecked During Battle.

GOLDSBORO, N. C., June 18.—(AP)—P. L. Flinchum, a prohibition enforcement officer, was killed and H. V. Andrews, another officer, wounded seriously yesterday in a gun fight with alleged rum runners, who escaped.

Two other officers, B. A. Dale and P. E. Street, sustained undetermined injuries when the automobile in which the four were riding when fired upon was wrecked.

The officers, attached to district enforcement headquarters at Wilson, gave chase to an automobile they suspected to be loaded with liquor at 3:30 o'clock this morning.

Near the city park here the officers' car drew alongside that of the rum runners and in exchange of shots Flinchum was wounded in the head and Andrews shot through the arm and shoulder. Flinchum was driving the automobile and when he was shot it left the road and crashed into a tree, injuring Dale and Street.

RAVENNA, O., June 18.—(AP)—Three men are dead and a fourth was at the point of death here today as the result of a shooting affray in an alleged bootleg feud.

All the bullets were fired by one man who turned the revolver on himself when he feared capture by police.

The dead are: Joseph Dinato, 49, the alleged gun wielder; Benjamin DeAngillis and Frank DeEulis 28.

The wounded man is Ralph D'Amico, 34, who is said to be the owner of the Roxy club, where the shooting occurred.

SURVEY SHOWS TORNADO TOLL OVER MILLION

Red Cross Reports 300 Families Affected—Seven Dead, 56 in Hospitals in Minnesota, Wisconsin.

RED WING, Minn., June 18.—(AP)—A Red Cross tabulation announced today revealed that tornadoes which struck in Minnesota and Wisconsin last Friday affected 300 families and caused damage of more than \$1,000,000 in two states.

Mrs. E. B. Ellis, national relief chairman of the Red Cross, announced the figures in appealing to residents of the two states to raise \$50,000 to aid sufferers in the storm districts.

Mrs. Ellis' survey showed: Seven dead and 56 in hospitals with serious injuries; scores slightly hurt; 40 homes destroyed, 65 badly damaged, 100 barns destroyed, 40 damaged; thousands of chickens and scores of head of livestock killed and hundreds of small farm buildings razed.

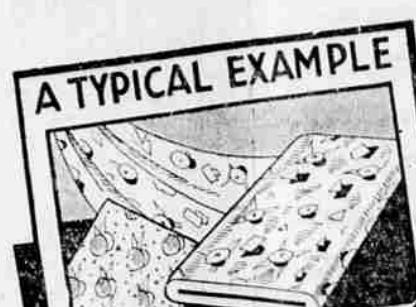

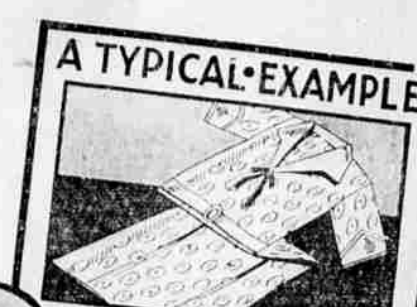
