HEAD-ON CRASH AT CENTRAL PT. MAY BE PROBED

Due to the inability of the coroner's jury to reach a satisfactory conclusion on facts surrounding the death of J. T. Conn, 28, Wood, Cal., lumberman, it is likely that the grand jury will investigate the auto crash Saturday at Central Point, where the man was killed in a collision with a car driven by Lee Smith, local creamery truck driver. The inquest was held yesterday afternoon at the Conger funeral parlors.

Testimony indicated that Smith was on the wrong side of the highway when his truck came in contact with the California machine, en route to Grants Pass, where Conn, accompanied by Mrs. Bessie Coston, Wood, were to be married. Smith claimed that the steering apparatus was defective or brakes on the machine locked, throwing his machine over to the wrong side of the highway.

Dr. W. H. Heckman testified that Conn died as a result of ruptured spleen, liver and kidney. Death overtook him in 30 minutes after the crash.
