POLICE NET SET FOR MAD KILLER

Eastern Bronx Combed for Slayer of Two—Warning Boasts of Third Murder—Hundreds of Police in Search for Body.

NEW YORK, June 19.—(AP)—Several hundred policemen searched the byways of the Eastern Bronx today for evidence of a third murder by the maniac blamed for two killings in Queens within a week. Search for the mad slayer shifted today to the Eastern Bronx, after an all-night vigil in Queens, when a newspaper received a warning in a newspaper purporting to come from the slayer himself, boasting that he had committed another murder, naming his victim as "Harry Bridenbach" and telling where the body would be found.

When Joseph Mozyanski, Queens delicatessen proprietor, was slain a week ago last night in his motor car parked beside a secluded road, his death was regarded as the work of a holdup man or a jealous enemy.

Girl Unharmed

But when Niel Sowley, young radio salesman, was slain in a similar manner Monday night, and when the killer escorted the girl who was with him to a transportation line which would take her to a subway station the young woman in the car with Mozyanski—and when a note mentioning the Mozyanski murder was found in the car beside Sowley's body, police agreed that both killings were the work of the same man, apparently a maniac.

This conclusion was supported by a letter to a New York news-

paper, received, it was said, before the actual findings of Sowley's body, announcing the killing and telling where the body would be found.

The killer warned in his letters that he would again strike last night in College Point, Queens, and 600 policemen blanketed the district in a search for him, but while they still scoured the vicinity early today another letter, purporting to come from the same source, reached the newspaper.

Named Spot

It said the killing had been done, but along the Boston post road in the Bronx, across Long Island Sound from the Borough of Queens. "Where is XSW? He is already dead. He is on the Boston post road. His name is Harold Bridenbach. Find the woman, old man, and you've got me."

This note caused Police Commissioner Mulrooney to shift his search to the Bronx, where an all-morning hunt had failed today to reveal a corpse or any sign of a killing.

LOW WING SHIP GAINS POPULARITY HOLD ON FLIERS

LOS ANGELES.—(AP)—Only a plane in the past among the endless list of aircraft, the low wing monoplane this year is making its bid for a front rank in American aviation.

With it one sensational flight has been made this year, and several others are nearing the stage for a takeoff. Another has ended in disaster.

In Europe, particularly in Germany, the low wing has been a more common figure of the air. It remained, however, for Col. Charles A. Lindbergh to start the low wing on its bid for fame in America.

With his wife on April 26, he crossed the United States in a low wing monoplane in 14 hours and 23 minutes, making one stop and the fastest transcontinental trip on record.

Three similar ships are receiving their final touches here for transoceanic flights. A fourth plane, built for a dash across the Pacific, was destroyed in tests and the pilot killed.
