

NAME MEDFORD VACATION LAND AND WIN PRIZE

Chamber Commerce Seeks Descriptive Phrase for Publicity Purposes—Maps to Be Used.

A cash prize has been offered for the best name adaptable to the scenic and recreational section surrounding Medford, by the publicity committee of the Medford Chamber of Commerce at a recent meeting. The suggestions for the name may be sent to committee members, W. A. Gates, S. S. Smith, C. W. McDonald, L. A. Banks and Earl Gaddis. The name is to be similar to the title used to describe Seattle and vicinity, "The Charmed Land," and as in a section of California, the "Golden Circle."

The committee also authorized the securing of 3000 state highway maps, including information of Medford and the Rogue River valley for tourists. A radio campaign to encourage greater use of home products was authorized and the chamber will sponsor a weekly program over KMED, the Mail Tribune-Virgin station, from 5:30 to 6 o'clock in the evening. Talks will be given by local speakers and cards will be issued to listeners for membership in the Home Products league.

SOFT METAL USE COMMERCIAL AIM

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Metals, soft enough to be cut with a knife, which decompose water at ordinary temperatures are being studied by the bureau of mines to find wider commercial uses for them.

Of this group of alkali metals, caesium and rubidium must be kept in a vacuum because if placed in dry oxygen at room temperature they ignite spontaneously.

Caesium, rubidium and lithium generally occur together in nature, it is pointed out. Silvery white and of very light weight, they tarnish rapidly in air.

Discovered through use of the spectroscope, caesium and rubidium are employed in the manufacture of photo-electric cells. Caesium is finding use in the manufacture of radio tubes. Lithium is widely employed for medicinal purposes. In pyrotechnics, lithium chloride is used to give a crimson color to fireworks and signal lights.

CALIFORNIA LEADS U. S. WITH LICENSED PILOTS

WASHINGTON—(AP)—California, with 2244 licensed pilots, leads the country with federally recognized fliers. New York, with 1153 licensed pilots, is the only other state above the 1000 mark.

Nevada and Vermont, with five licensed pilots each, have the least. The entire country, including possessions, has 11,499 licensed fliers. Women pilots total 197.

Transport pilots outnumber licensed private fliers 5667 to 4555. There are 6819 licensed aircraft.

Hay Adds Scotch Flavor To Amos 'N' Andy Air Act

CHICAGO—(AP)—The popularity of Amos 'n' Andy, black face radio sensations, has a mellow Scotch flavor.

The Scotch flavor is Bill Hay, now one of America's outstanding announcers. Who not so long ago was selling furniture and phonograph records in a little town in Nebraska. When Bill's clean-cut Scotch burr bites the air, announcing the radio's favorites, or sends millions to bed in good humor with the famous "guld night to y' n'." It's not synthetic Scotch that does it. Bill was born in Dunfermline, Scotland.

In school, he sat in the seat once occupied by Barrie, and thought of becoming a surgeon. Then he worked for Thomas Cook and Son in London and decided to go to India. Finally he came to the United States and landed in Nebraska, selling furniture.

When KFKX was established at Hastings, Neb., as the relay station for KDKA, a program director and announcer was needed. Bill Hay got both jobs. When interwired radio succeeded relays Hay came to Chicago to "make radio, not a job, but a profession," he says.

Bill has been doing the announcing for Amos 'n' Andy since their earliest days when they were Sam 'n' Henry on WGN. For a long time listeners thought that it was he who was doubling both as the announcer and the gruff-voiced half of the pair, because of the particular enunciation. This theory blew up after Amos 'n' Andy began making stage appearances.

When the chance came to do their stuff on the NBC chain, his voice was considered highly important to their comic-strip presentations. So he is still a part of their radio careers, started in January, 1925.

To the question: "Are you married?" he answers with a loan from Amos 'n' Andy: "Check and double check."

OLD RED SHIRTS HOLD SPOTLIGHT WITH MUSSOLINI SMILE AND FROWN YIELD SECRET OF MAN'S EVOLUTION

FLORENCE, Italy—(AP)—Red-shirted veterans of Garibaldi's campaigns, wearing square-voiced "forage caps" strikingly similar to those used by Union soldiers in the Civil war, were centers of attraction second only to Benito himself on Mussolini's recent "progress" through the provinces.

At every big meeting in the public squares, and at the mammoth military review here, the grizzled octogenarians were in evidence.

Being mostly of sturdy peasant stock, they trudged by twos and threes along with the youngsters of the Black Shirt militia, taking all the dust and heat. Only a few of them consented to use canes and if any member of a local reception committee had no such as dared offer them an automobile he would have had a duel on his hands.

They all turned out in uniform, their red-ched breasts heavy with medals. The invariable gaudy bandana handkerchief was found every neck. Their trousers were baggy old affairs, some of corduroy, others reminiscent of the exact zouaves. It was surprising how few of them wore eyeglasses, and not a one turned up with crutches or in a wheel chair.

These remarkably spry "ancients," whose service records date back to anywhere between 1849 and 1870, asked no special favors, but got many. Mussolini let it be known that their uniform was a good pass when they wanted to get near him, and wherever he spoke there was always a little knot of them right under the balcony, hanging on every word.
