## GLENUP CREW AT CRATER LAKE FOR LODGE RENOVATION

Preparations for the opening of the Crater Lake lodge season on June 25, a week from tomorrow, were gotten under way today, although R. W. Price, general manager, has been up to the national park with a culinary crew operating the cafeteria at the rim for over a week, when the first clean-up crew of the big lodge, which had arrived in the city last night, were taken up to the lodge this morning and at once began the work of getting that hostelry in condition.

Another crew of lodge and other concession employees will arrive in the city over Sunday and will be taken up to the park on Monday. Then every day following until the lodge opening date, the remainder of the many employees will be gradually arriving, and a contingent will be sent up each day.

While the lodge and other concessions will begin operations on June 25, the formal opening of the Crater Lake season will not take place until three days later, on July 1st.

The stages between Crater Lake and Medford, and vice versa, which are now only making trips to take employees up to the lodge, will begin their daily round trips on July 1st.

O. M. Murphy, who will again be in charge of the Medford-Crater Lake stages this season, said today that the stages, beginning on July 1st will leave the local passenger station at 10:30 and 11:40 a. m. and will return from the lake later that afternoon, so as to meet the evening trains.

## NO ACTION TAKEN UPON RATE CASE

The joint executive committee, composed of members of the Fruitgrowers league, the chamber of commerce, and the Rogue River traffic association met this noon at the Hotel Medford and discussed the position of the Medford district in the pending Northwest rate case. No definite action was taken, as there was none to take. It was learned that the re-arrangements on the Northwest case have been set for next October.

The recent ruling of the United States supreme court, holding the Hoke Smith resolution was unconstitutional, does not materially affect the Northwest case, as it is based on asserted discriminatory rates.

## FRENCH SARDINES

The title "Sardine" was originally applied to the young of the small Mediterranean pilchard, a fish nearly allied to the herring, caught off the island of Sardinia, but it long ago overstepped that restrictive definition, first adding young pilchards taken off the coast of France. The famous French sardine—and later many other kinds off the coasts of Norway and America.

The French fisherman's great aim is to land the catch as speedily as possible to insure their absolute freshness, and as a consequence they are often at the canneries within an hour or two after capture.

## NORWEGIAN SARDINES

Norwegian sardines are the very smallest of the herring family. The best grades are very fine and the industry has grown enormously during the past few decades.

Importations of this quality pack of sardines are now greatly in excess of those of the French product and the demand is steadily increasing.

## AMERICAN SARDINES

The canning of domestic sardines in oil, mustard and otherwise, is an important business and large quantities are consumed.

On the Atlantic coast the small herring is used and on the Pacific various young fishes, chiefly the "California Sardine" which closely resembles the Mediterranean sardine in character and flavor.

The fact that domestic sardines fail to obtain the higher prices and favor of the imported product is not due to any noteworthy difference in the fish themselves, but to the extraordinary care exercised by the leading European canneries to achieve the finest possible results. With similar care, there seems no reason why the American sardine should not be rated as highly as any other packing.

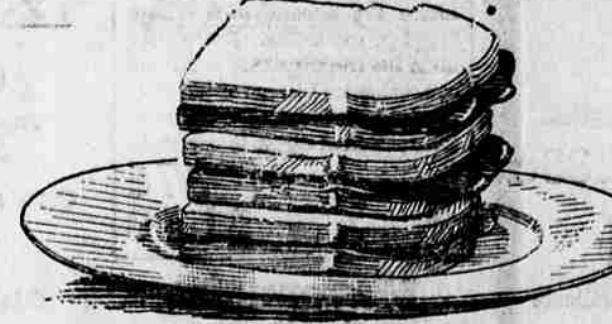
