

2 GIRL SCOUTS LOST IN WOODS REPORTED SAFE

Telephone Ranger Station After Wandering Since Tuesday in Dense Forest of Yakima Valley.

YAKIMA, Wash., June 20.—(AP)—Yakima's lost Girl Scouts, Evelyn Krautkremer and Marion Converse, who disappeared Tuesday in the Pike's Peak district of the upper Yakima valley, today were safe at

The last crossing ranger station is King county, E. J. Fenby, who was in charge of rangers in the search, reported. The girls, Fenby's meager report said, stumbled past the cabin at the station and noticed the out-door telephone and called Ranger Nevin McCullough, 12 miles away. McCullough left for the Last Crossing station immediately after getting the girls' message. He carried food for the two, who have been wandering in the forest since they became lost Tuesday after wandering away from their camp. McCullough reported to Fenby that the girls' voices were strong when he talked with them.

HEAVY RAINFALL MOUNTAIN AREA

While .63 of an inch of rain was falling in Medford early last evening and during the night, making

in all 13.37 inches that had fallen in the Medford vicinity since September 1st, last, heavy rain and hail were falling in the mountains and in some sections of the surrounding foothills, but the local weather bureau had heard of no hail falling in the valley. The rain and hail were especially heavy throughout the Crater National forest during the storm, which was accompanied by much thunder and lightning, and in some sections of the forest the ground was white with hail. No lightning fires were started in the forest during the storm, at least no such reports had been received at the forest headquarters here up to this noon.

A rumor on the streets this noon that heavy hail had fallen in the western section of the valley and caused damage could not be verified either at the county agent's office or the local weather bureau, as no such occurrence had been reported at either place. Unsettled weather is forecast for tonight.

SCIENCE AN ADJUNCT IN LUMBERING

Tree Diseases and Fire Take Huge Annual Toll of Forests—Burning of Slashing Injurious in Reforestation, Assertion.

EUGENE, Ore., June 20.—(AP)—Lumbermen and scientists gathered here yesterday for the forest symposium of the annual session of the Pacific division of the American Association for the Advancement of Science were told that tree diseases take an annual toll of six billion feet of timber valued at \$878,000,000 and that forest fires destroy annually from 10 to 20 million acres of timber. E. I. Klotz, director of the California forest experiment station, declared western lumbermen must come to realize that slashing and burning is not only out of date, but very injurious to reforestation. Clearing of land should be done scientifically, he said, and protection of forest from fire should be done more intelligently. Forest fires must be followed by careful reforestation and these new forests must be protected, he felt, by the association.

E. P. Keen of the Pacific northwest forest experiment station, Portland, told the scientists of studies now being carried on to determine the life habits of insects that cause damage to trees estimated at more than \$15,000,000 annually. E. E. Hubert, University of Idaho, predicted trees will be harvested in the future before they are affected by decay and that many wood products will be made from pulp manufactured from small, but sound trees.

E. I. Munger, Pacific northwest forest experiment station, Portland, criticized modern logging methods, especially the use of the "high lead" system which breaks down thousands of smaller trees. He said the slashing and burning of debris kills all vegetation and makes it hard to obtain a new growth of Douglas fir.

Dr. Wilson Compton, secretary and manager of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, declared the perpetuation of the lumber industry is a real challenge to science.

A caravan of fifty members of the Northern California Creamery Operators association, which started from Yreka Monday, were expected to arrive in Medford this afternoon, and visit the local creameries. A banquet, in charge of John Snider, is scheduled for this evening at the Hotel Medford, to be given by the local creamery men and the chamber of commerce.

Professor Brandt of Oregon State college will be the main speaker at the banquet this evening.

The caravan will leave in the morning for Crater Lake, and from there go to Klamath Falls where they will disperse following a luncheon in that city. A luncheon was given by the Ashland creamery operators today noon for the California creamery men.

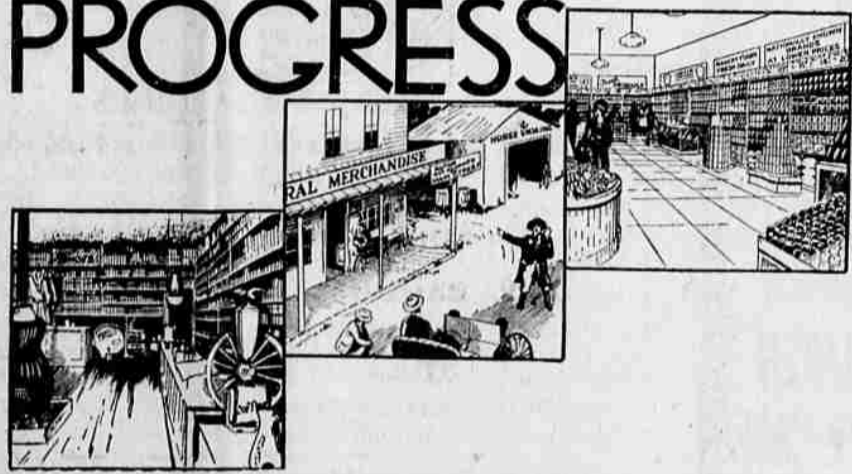
Vote on Vets Bill Monday. WASHINGTON, June 20.—(AP)—The senate today agreed to vote on the veterans' relief bill on next Monday.
