PUBLIC HEALTH ASSOCIATION TO MEET SATURDAY

Gaily colored posters, which tell a story of interest to all people of Jackson county, were being placed on the walls of the club room of the First Presbyterian church this morning in preparation for the annual meeting of the Jackson County Public Health association tomorrow.

Charts and reports with figures, which will be released tomorrow, add much to the interesting appearance of the room. They reveal a status for Jackson county in the field of health work, which few residents suspect or anticipate.

The meeting, which will open tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock for round table discussions, will be open to all persons interested in health work.

Following the round table discussions, reports will be given of the work accomplished in each community of the county. These will be in the form of demonstrations. Some communities will present playlets and motion pictures portraying their projects.

The meeting will re-open in the afternoon at 2 o'clock, following the luncheon, which will be served by the ladies of the Presbyterian church. Several state health workers will be present.

OATMAN STARTING WAR ON EARWIGS MONDAY MORNING

Date for opening of the earwig campaign in this city has been set for Monday, June 23. Elmer Oatman, announced this morning. All bugs, who expect to survive, are advised to hide out on that day. Mr. Oatman, accompanied by a small crew of men, will start the survey of the main section of the city Monday.

Residents will be notified if earwigs are found in their gardens and urged to start poisoning. They will not be forced to kill the insects however, as there is no ordinance in existence which makes earwig poisoning compulsory.

Mr. Oatman and assistants are asking for the co-operation of the people in the campaign to keep down the bugs, which have come to be such a nuisance in northern cities.

Full instructions for killing earwigs will be given to heads of all residences where the bugs are located.
