Receives Second Medal From President for South Pole Achievements—Country Thrilled.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd turned toward home today and the plaudits of old friends and neighbors eager to add their own acclaim for his daring exploits, to that of New York and Washington.

He was the proud possessor of the second medal to be presented to him by a president of the United States in honor of his achievements in exploring the polar regions by airplane.

The decoration, a special medal of the National Geographic society, was conferred upon him last night by President Hoover in commemoration of his south pole flight. The presentation took place on the same stage upon which he received from President Coolidge a medal in honor of his flight over the north pole.

In lauding the aviator's accomplishments, Mr. Hoover said he spoke not only for himself but for the nation as a whole.

"For men of our race to master extraordinary difficulties, to carry through great adventure, thrills us with pride, with hope and with confidence," he said.

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Republicans to Discuss Taxes

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—A conference of the Republican members of the house has been called for Tuesday night to discuss what effect pending World War veterans' legislation will have on the treasury and the question of taxes during the next calendar year.

Representative Hawley, Republican, Oregon, chairman of the conference, issued the call late today after a meeting of the steering committee, an unofficial group composed of Republican leaders in the house.
