EARLY REMOVAL OF PARK SNOWS LURES TOURISTS

During the first ten days of June 5000 visitors reached Crater Lake over the excellent highway from Medford and Klamath Falls. In past years the park highways were open to travel only after the heavy snow had melted away sufficiently to permit removal by hand labor. This year, with the use of new modern snow removal equipment, highways were opened to travel two months earlier than in 1929, with pronounced decrease in snow removal costs.

During the first ten days of June, 1930, a total of 5111 cars were driven over park roads, among which were included cars from 32 states and three provinces of Canada. Travel report for the week ending June 14, 1930, follows:
