Superintendent E. O. Solinsky of Crater Lake national park and R. W. Price of the Crater Lake lodge as well as the hosts of local friends of Crater Lake, are much interested in the fact that authorization for appropriation of \$3,000,000 annually for six consecutive years for construction of approach roads to national parks to connect with federal aid highway is proposed in a bill favorably reported to the house last week from the public lands committee. It provides that funds thus provided shall not be used in building more than 60 miles of road on any one project. The measure is approved by the budget and is placed in position for enactment at the next session.

I have come back double and am on my honeymoon now. Yes, I was married a week ago at Santa Ana, Calif., to Miss Elinor Jeffords, also of Hollywood, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Latham of Kansas City, Mo. I obtained vacation leave and we just quietly sneaked over to Santa Ana, were married and started on our honeymoon north, in order to avoid any wedding hullabaloo on the part of the Hollywood newspaper fraternity and other friends of this city."

CORSET SALESMAN WHO BECAME KING OF MELODY, DIES
MT. VERNON, N. J., June 21.—Leo Feist, one-time corset salesman who became an American magnate of popular music publishing, died today at his home here at the age of 60 years.

For several years Feist had suffered arthritis and was a virtual invalid but until a few days before his death he directed from his home the business that bore his name.

When Feist first entered upon his publishing career about 35 years ago he was an unsuccessful song writer who made his living selling corsets. In the subsequent years he saw the product of his ditty factory go to every country of the world, including remote parts of Africa.

It was Feist who introduced modern business principles into music publishing, giving first national, then international distribution to tin-pan alley's product.
