AMATEUR TITLE FOR NORTHWEST WON BY HOGAN

Portland Youth Wins High Honor In Sparkling Play—Aided By Kid Brother—New Champion Shows Mettle.

VANCOUVER GOLF CLUB, Vancouver, B. C., June 21.—(AP)—The golfing firm of "Hogan and Hogan" today accomplished its greatest stroke of business in the history of the 23-year-old organization.

Under the watchful eye of his 16-year-old brother, caddy and coach, Johnny Hogan, Eddie captured eight birdies in the 29 holes he played against Robbins, and brought the match down to 19 in spite of sparkling play by his opponent. With ten holes to go and ten holes down, Robbins won the twenty-seventh and twenty-eighth with birdies before he bowed to defeat with a half at the twenty-ninth. Hogan was four under par for the twenty-nine holes, while Robbins was six over.

Mrs. Vera Hutchings of Vancouver won her fourth northwest championship and her second in the last two years, when she walked through her final match with Mrs. Fred Jackson of Seattle, 11 and 3.

After going five down on the morning round to some of the most spectacular golf seen during the tournament, Robbins started out strong in the afternoon to win the first hole with a birdie three. He sank a forty-foot putt on the big rolling green to reduce the count to four down.

The loss did not bother the new champion in the least, as he came right back to drop an eight-foot putt at the second hole for a win and then sank a 66-footer at the fourth for another birdie to lead by six holes. The marvelous putts seemed to take the heart out of Robbins and he dropped the next four holes to go ten down and ten to go.

With the result then only a matter of time, Johnny stepped out and picked up a par win at the ninth and a birdie at the tenth to make it dormie, 8. Robbins' putt for a win at the eleventh balanced on the lip of the cup, but would not drop, thus giving Hogan an eight hole lead with only seven to go.

PORTLAND LOSES HECTIC BATTLE

OAKLAND, June 21.—(AP)—Oakland nosed out Portland, 2-1 today in a bitterly contested tenning game featured by a pitching duel between Herb McQuaid of the Oaks and Junk Walters of the visitors.

McQuaid, recently signed by Oakland after his release by the Missions, received snappy support. Walters had the edge in pitching, allowing five hits while McQuaid was nipped for eight.

MAX-JACK BOUT IN SEPTEMBER SEEMS LIKELY

Sharkey Offers to Buy Off Schmelling's Manager For Return Match—Final Decision Due Monday.

NEW YORK, June 21.—(AP)—Conferences bloomed all over town today and Madison Square Garden promised something important in the way of announcements concerning Max Schmelling's return bout with Jack Sharkey by Monday afternoon.

The final conference between Garden officials and Arthur Dwyer, deposed manager of the German who won the heavyweight championship on a foul from Sharkey June 12, is scheduled for Monday. After that is over the Garden hopes to be able to announce that the last bar to a return match in September has been removed.

Schmelling is ready if he can gain a release from Dwyer's managerial contract which does not expire until October 12. Otherwise he insists he will remain idle until the entangling alliance with Dwyer is wiped out by time. Sharkey is so anxious to remove the stain of his defeat on a foul he is already on record at the New York State Athletic commission as willing to buy Dwyer's 20 per cent share in Schmelling's wages.

Apparently the unfortunate sailor from Boston bought something when he made that offer. Frank Bruen, general manager of the Garden, left for Boston tonight to talk with Sharkey and his manager, John Buckley, as to the terms of the purchase. Sharkey's answer probably will be enclosed in Monday's proclamation.

Dwyer is said to be willing to tear up the contract for about \$50,000, which would approximate his share in Max's profit from a return match.
