

NAME FOR LINDY SON INTERESTS

Public Sure Father or Grandfather Will Be Honored—Mother and Babe Making Satisfactory Progress, Is Meager Report.

ENGLEWOOD, N. J., June 24.—(P)—Public interest in the son born to Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh was centered today upon the choice of a name for the famous infant.

Despite the reticence of Colonel Lindbergh and other members of the Morrow household since the announcement of the birth, the public seemed to take it for granted that the child would be christened either Charles Augustus Jr., after his father, or Charles Dwight, a name combining that of his father and his maternal grandfather, Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow.

Unofficial word filtered past the guards at the gate of the Morrow estate that Mrs. Anne Lindbergh and the son born on her twenty-fourth birthday were "making satisfactory progress," but that was all.

Messages Flow In

A messenger boy filled up the bill to the Morrow home at half-hour intervals all day yesterday, each time bringing a sheet of telegrams and cablegrams of congratulation from all parts of the world. Among them were messages from President Hoover, Don Manuel C. Tellez, Mexican ambassador to Washington, and persons prominent in aviation circles.

Flowers and other gifts sent by friends were delivered in a truck. A baby carriage manufacturer who attempted to deliver a sample of his product as a gift to the Lindbergh baby was turned back at the gate with the information relayed from the house through the guards that the Lindberghs had not ordered a baby carriage and did not want one.

FORMER FEDERAL MAN TAKES BRIDE

George E. Haugen, former well known postal inspector of this district and erstwhile resident of Medford, who about two years ago obtained a transfer from that service to become city superintendent of mails of Klamath Falls, having severed his connection with the postal service some time ago for a business position in that city, arrived in Medford several days ago with his bride of a week or so, to make their home in Medford. It seems that following his recent marriage, the second one for him, at Klamath Falls, the newlyweds went north on a honeymoon trip from which they have returned to Medford and have taken a residence on West Fourth street. Concerning their marriage and locating here the Klamath Falls News says:

"Mr. and Mrs. George E. Haugen will make their home in Medford where Mr. Haugen will enter business, according to word received here by friends. Mrs. Haugen will be remembered as Miss Faith Williams, who resided here for the past year."

Pittsaurie, an Irishman, and two Germans, Captain Hermann Koehl and the late Baron Von Hünefeld.

Fell Short of Goal

Even they fell short of their goal, landing at Greenley Island, a lonely spot on the coast of Labrador, where they were for days before they could be brought southward.

Captain Kingsford Smith's most famous previous flight was his trip from Oakland airport on the coast of California to Wheeler Field, Honolulu, and thence by way of the Fiji Islands, to Australia, his native land. That was in June, 1928.

Although loaded to capacity with gasoline the big ship raced 11,000 yards down the runway and then rose gracefully. It circled Port Marnock, which is 7 miles north-east of Dublin, once, and then turned westward toward Galway and the open ocean.

Ten thousand spectators witnessed the departure, cheering frantically as the plane left the ground. Among those present were Governor General MacNeil, the American Minister Frederick A. Sterling and Mrs. Sterling, and others.

Ahead of the ship at its departure lay a course of 3364 miles to New York.

The airman expected a trip of about 34 hours, which would bring him to New York at about 8:27 a. m. (E. S. T.) Wednesday.

ROAD WORK IN COUNTY UNDER WAY FOR 1930

Engineer Rynning Reports Dead Indian, Lake Creek, Elk Creek Routes Receiving Attention.

The 1930 road construction and improvement program for Jackson county is now in full swing, County Engineer Paul Rynning said this morning.

Work has started on the Dead Indian market road, and the Lake Creek market road, two steam shovels being in operation on the former work. Operations will continue on both, until snow flies.

The entrance of the Dead Indian road into Ashland, is still under discussion, but it is expected that an agreement will be reached soon between the city of Ashland and the county court. The state engineer's office, may make the final decision following a survey. A petition circulated in the Ashland district for the speedy building of the road, is expected to come before the county court at its regular meeting tomorrow.

Work has also been started on both ends of the Elk creek road, which will eventually be a loop road from Rogue Elk to the Crater Lake highway, near Prospect. On the Earl Ulrich unit of the Elk creek road, a steam shovel has whittled down two of the worst grades, widened and put it in shape for graveling.

Oiling To Start

Oiling of the unpaved portions of the Ruch highway and the Sams Valley market road (Midway highway) will start as soon as the oiling plant is completed.

Delay is now being experienced by the presence of a postal telegraph pole, in the middle of the Southern Pacific spur to the oiling plant. Nobody this side of New York City has the authority to order the pole moved, but the county engineer said he expected to have the red tape required to move the pole unraveled by the end of the week.

As soon as these two roads are given their coat of 400 degree oil, the county court may answer the pleas of housewives living on dusty roads for an application of oil.

ROGUE RIVER, Ore., June 24.—(Special)—Fred Denzler, foreman of the section crew, has the killing of two large rattlesnakes within the past few days, to his credit. The first had nine rattles and a button, and the last thirteen rattles.
