### AVERAGE PARENTS SPEND \$7238 ON EACH CHILD SHOWN

According to Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, of the state board of health, a study of Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. charts shows the cost to an average family in rearing a child to 18 years of age is \$7238.

Basing the "average" on a family income of \$2500 per year the charts show the following figures: Cost of being born.....\$ 250 Food..... 2500 Clothing and shelter..... 3,400 Education (minor items met by individual family purse) 50 Health..... 284 Recreation..... 130 Insurance..... 54 Sundries..... 570

Total.....\$7,238 Under the heading of "shelter" there is included the item of taxes which covers the parents' share of the community cost of education, as well as other items furnished by the state.
