

BOLIVIAN REPORTED IN REVOLT

Serious Clashes Occur in Capital—Demonstrators Storm Police Headquarters—Reds Take Possession 4 Provinces.

ARICA, Chile, June 26.—(AP)—The conductor of the international train arriving from La Paz last night said that a grave disturbance had occurred in the Bolivian capital Sunday, and that eighty persons had been killed, of whom seven were students.

Strictest censorship prevails. Travelers arriving here from Bolivia today said that police in La Paz, Bolivian capital, killed 34 members of a meeting of workers and students Sunday. Among the dead were said to have been women and children.

The demonstrators took the corpses and afterwards exhibited them in the streets. The travelers said the city was tense when they left and it was feared further trouble would occur when the victims' bodies were buried.

BUENOS AIRES, June 26.—(AP)—The newspaper Critica, in a special edition, today said clashes of a most serious nature have occurred in La Paz, Bolivia.

Critica says that former President Siles has taken refuge in the U. S. legation.

Passengers arriving on the international train which left La Paz Sunday, today confirmed the reports.

The travelers reported 1000 demonstrators stormed the police headquarters in Murillo square, bombarding it with stones and other missiles.

Militia re-informed the police and volleys were fired into the mob. Several persons were killed.

The newspaper Critica stated it had received a private message from La Paz saying that revolutionaries had taken possession of the departments of Cochabamba, Oruro, Potosi and Santa Cruz.

WILL RECONSIDER RAILROAD MERGER

WASHINGTON, June 26.—(AP)—The house interstate commerce committee today amended its draft of the senate railroad consolidation resolution to forbid consummation of the proposed merger of the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific railroads until after next March 1.

Since the bill had previously been approved, it will be necessary for the committee to offer its amendment formally when the measure is taken up on the floor of the house.

The action was a concession to a group of Northwest home members, who have bitterly opposed adjournment until steps were taken to suspend the northern line merger.

OREGON SHARES IN PUBLIC LAND ROAD BENEFITS

State Among Thirteen in West to Receive Aid for Routes Across Unaided Terrain.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 26.—(AP)—Thirteen western states would benefit by the Oddie-Colton bill just signed by President Hoover. It authorizes federal cooperation in construction of roads through unreserved public and Indian lands.

Funds authorized under the act will be available only to states which have more than five per cent of their area in non-taxable federal lands.

The 11 so-called public land states that would receive the greatest benefit, and the proportion their unreserved public and Indian lands bear to total area, follow: Washington, 30.6; Oregon, 45.6; California, 49.7; Idaho, 57.3; Nevada, 84.2; Wyoming, 51.8; Utah, 66.3; Colorado, 32.2; Arizona, 66.8; New Mexico, 37.7.

South Dakota and Oklahoma also come under the provisions of the act.

The house road committee, reporting favorably on the bill, said: "It has long been recognized as most desirable that some means be found to hasten completion of the main roads that cross these unreserved federal reservations in states whose resources are limited and which derive very little direct benefit from the construction of highways across these lands owned by the federal government. It is believed passage of the pending bill will be of real assistance in that regard."

The act carries no authorization for this year, but Senator Oddie, Nevada, co-author, said annual authorization of at least \$2,500,000 would be asked at the next session.

New-born Infant Buried Alive In Shallow Grave

EL PASO, Tex., June 26.—(AP)—Buried alive for an hour, a newborn infant was rescued from a shallow grave late yesterday after a boy had seen two women put the child in the ground near Fabens, 32 miles east of here. He notified Frank Gomez, a farm hand who effected the rescue.

The baby was brought to the city-county hospital where, today, it was said the child would live. El Paso county authorities are searching for the women.

Editor Kimber Visits Medford

Mr. and Mrs. B. J. Kimber and two children of Grants Pass were in Medford Wednesday. Mr. Kimber, who is editor of the Grants Pass Bulletin, says it looks like Grants Pass would soon own the water plant. It is now owned by the Grants Pass Water Co., an eastern corporation, but negotiations now pending may be settled soon.

SOVIET WARNED IN PERSECUTING MOSLEM TURKS

By Trisetha Ring. (Associated Press Correspondent) ISTANBUL.—(AP) Secular though the Turkish state has become, and strong as is her friendship with Soviet Russia, Turkish indignation over the religious situation in Russia has been expressed by the semi-official daily, "Djumouriet."

The paper declares that the movement seeks to erase 25,000,000 Moslem Turks and their national ideals from Russia. Citation is made of reports that 8000 mosques have been closed in the district of Idli-Oural; that 14,500 Moslem worshippers have been condemned to death or deported and that the Chief Mufti has been arrested for refusing to sign a statement that the Moslems in Russia have not been persecuted.

The Turkish paper warns the soviet union that elimination of Turkey was one aim of the czars, as it was their aim also to stretch to kill the independence of Turkey—and in return, Turkey helped to kill the czars.

Turkey aided the soviets because they promised to leave Turkey mistress of her own destiny and "it is friendship's duty on our part," the "Djumouriet" concludes, "to remind the soviets of these lessons of history."

LAW SEEKING TO IDENTIFY BODIES CHORE BOY TRIAL

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 26.—(AP)—The murder trial of Clifford Campbell, 18, farm boy, charged with killing Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Northrup, Clark county ranchers, by touching off 30 sticks of dynamite under their bedroom, passed into the fourth day today with Dale McMullen, prosecuting attorney, endeavoring to positively identify the dead persons.

So badly were the bodies mangled by the explosion that identification was practically impossible and positive identification, authorities said, has never been made. To complete his case, McMullen will be forced to prove that the mutilated bodies found in the wreckage of the farm home were those of the Northrups.

The defense attorney, during the questioning of H. K. Luggner, grocer, established the fact that Luggner, who knew the Northrups intimately, could not positively identify the bodies.

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YOUTHFUL FLIERS CRASH IN KANSAS
