# ASKS PROBE IN FLUCTUATIONS OF STOCK MART

WASHINGTON, June 26.—(AP)—An investigation by a special house committee of the fluctuations in the prices of securities in Wall Street was asked Wednesday in a resolution introduced by Representative Dickinson, Republican, Iowa.

The Iowan, who recently won the Republican nomination for senator, proposed that the committee be directed to determine whether stock manipulation is practiced by short selling or block sales for the purpose of benefiting a limited number of investors but against the interest of the general public.

The committee also would be directed to ascertain to what extent the New York stock exchanges have been utilized by manipulators for the purpose of influencing legislation or exercising an unfavorable influence on legislation pending in congress.

# ANTI-COMMISSION MOVE WITHDRAWN

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—George Bylander, of Portland, sponsor of the initiative petition abolishing the public service commission, today announced that petitions which had been submitted to the county clerk for checking would be withdrawn.

The chief registrar in the county clerk's office said Bylander's reason for withdrawing the petitions was that they did not meet the requirements or approval of the secretary of state.

The petitions will not be recirculated as amended petitions must be filed by July 3.

# CHINESE REBELS ENTER TSIANFU

TOKYO, June 26.—(AP)—A Ren-go News Agency dispatch today from Tsianfu, capital of Shantung, said one regiment of Shanai troops, allies of the rebellious northern faction, entered the city this afternoon. Northern occupation of the city was orderly as nationalist forces evacuated it during the early morning.

Han Pa-Chu, nationalist commander, left Tsianfu on a special train at 3 a. m., and the evacuation was completed an hour later.

# ALBANY SEES HOPE OF ORE. ELEC. EXTENSION

ALBANY, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—Business men of Albany today continued to discuss the possibility of an extension of the Oregon Electric, now under construction up the Santiam valley.

They said it would require but 40 miles of construction to proceed through the Santiam Pass across the Cascades into Bend. Such a line would reduce the distance between the coastal counties of the state and the eastern section.
