

# Western Crews Not Disgruntled by Losses at Poughkeepsie

## BEST CREW WON SAYS MANAGER OF WASHINGTON

Shipped Much Water in Rough Going, But Did Not Row in Top Form—Have No Excuse.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 27.—(AP)—Reports of western crews being dissatisfied with the conditions under which intercollegiate varsity races were rowed yesterday, and having threatened not to return to the Hudson next year, were described by representatives of the westerners today as "absolutely untrue."

The basis for these reports appeared to be the fact several motor craft, including a coast guard patrol vessel, in keeping abreast of leading crews in the varsity race, caused a swell and helped increase the waters shipped by Washington, Columbia, Navy and others which trailed the Cornell crew to the finish.

Washington, only one of the three western eight crews affected by these conditions, offered no alibi, much less considering any protest.

"You can say for us we lost to better crews yesterday," said Earl Campbell, graduate manager of Washington. "We shipped a lot of water in the rough going, so much so that two of our men had to jump overboard at the finish to keep the 'Pay Streak' from going under the waves, but we did not row our best race, anyway."

Washington is satisfied the best crew won the race and congratulates Cornell as well as Syracuse for a great performance.

Campbell's statement was echoed by Al Erickson, Washington's head coach, who declared he had no excuse.

Hottel of Cleveland has the most hits in the American league with 56, yet neither he nor Klein lead their leagues in hitting.

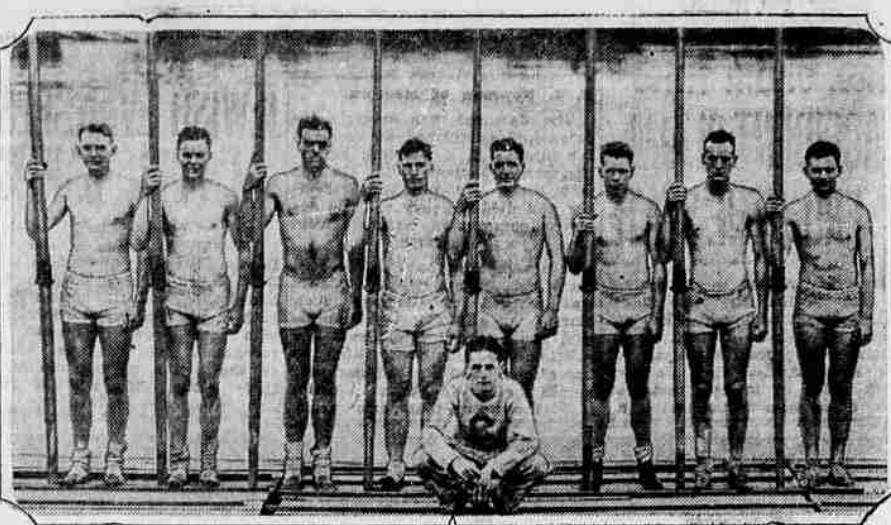

## With Rod and Gun In Rogue Valley

Fly fishing is just as applicable to small mouth black bass as trout, and crappies and perch can be caught by this lure just as well, local sportsmen say, especially these adherents of the backwater behind Gold Ray dam. Bass fishing has always been good at Hyatt Prairie dam, in the Green-spring mountains, easily accessible at this time of the year and boats are not necessary.

Shore fishing has resulted in numerous good catches and flies are known to have their share of the credit, especially on bright days. Fly fishing in the Gold Ray backwater and Hyatt Prairie dam has proven sportier than the use of wooden minnows and plugs, but furnish more difficult angling due to the absence of the several hooks attached to the other lures.

Bass spawning season is the spring of the year when the eggs are laid on a stick, rock or other object protruding from the bottom of the water. The male stands guard over the nest and protects the small fry until they are able to take care of themselves. During this period the fish are very vicious and easy to catch.

For that reason, closed seasons for bass have been proposed as a means of protection during the spawning season.

Next Sunday will probably find the usual good sized delegation of Medford anglers at Hyatt Prairie and successful catches are anticipated.

Fishing is reported to be better than average at Fish Lake and the road is in as good condition as it ever is in the summer time. The trip can be made in three hours with the last few miles for ward the lake the worst to traverse. Boats are for rent by Hoyt Smith who has also begun the construction of a resort to accommodate fishermen in season. A limit of 15 eastern brook trout has been set for that body of water but efforts are being made to have the limit cut down to ten. Latest reports indicate that trolling is the best method for Fish lake.

Yanks and Cleveland Cross Plate 24 Times — New York Giants Contribute National Loop Hits.

The New York Yankees have won seven out of their last 10 games without improving their position for Washington and Philadelphia have each won eight out of 10. The Athletics are a game and one-half ahead of the Senators with the Yankees another half game back.

The Yanks won yesterday, after a struggle with Cleveland. The count was 13 to 11. Nine of Cleveland's runs came in the last four innings.

Philadelphia and Washington were victors by big scores in a day which produced 166 hits by the eight American league clubs and 74 runs. The Athletics made 13 blows, eight of them for extra bases, off Sammy Gray, and defeated St. Louis, 8 to 3. Washington, scoring seven runs in the first inning, trounced Detroit, 12 to 1.

Even the humble Boston Red Sox did some heavy hitting, defeating the Pale Hose, 9 to 7.

The New York Giants outdid anything the American league could offer by piling up 20 hits to beat St. Louis, 12 to 4.

Pittsburgh won the first game from Philadelphia, 1 to 0. Every Pirate clouted the ball at least once in the second game to bring an 11 to 5 decision.

The highly heralded struggle of the teams between Brooklyn and Chicago turned into a demonstration in honor of Dazzy Vance which put the Robins two full games in the lead with a 7 to 1 triumph.
